## Handgun Prohibition Notice for Meetings of Governmental Entities

## **Current Enforcement**



- Currently, Chapter 27 Article VIII addresses Habitual Nuisance Properties.
- A property is presumed a Habitual Nuisance Property if the property is the site of three or more citations for code violations within 365 days.
- However, currently "code violations" are limited to:
  - Overcrowding (Chapter 16, Dallas Fire Code)
  - Noise (Chapters 30 and 51A)
  - Promoters (Chapter 38A)
  - Valet Parking Services (Chapter 43)
  - Conditions in planned development or specific use permit ordinances regulating outdoor live music, outdoor patios, the operation of outdoor speakers and amplification, and hours of operation of a use.



# **Current Enforcement (continued)**



- Ideally, owners abate violations of the city code following a notice of violation.
- When voluntary compliance is not achieved, the city has certain escalated enforcement strategies:
  - Re-inspection fees for graded inspections;
  - Citations;
  - Referrals to nuisance abatement/liens; and/or
  - Lawsuits in municipal or district court



# Current Enforcement (continued)



However, each enforcement option has limitations:

- Repeat violations;
- Does not rise to litigation threshold;
- Cost of doing business;
- Unpaid liens

The unresolved nuisances continue to negatively impact neighboring communities' quality of life and divert city resources.

## **Enhancement Recommendation**



Consider expanding Article VIII, "Habitual Nuisance Properties," of Chapter 27-11 of the Dallas City Code to include minimum property standards as an abatable nuisance activity, enhancing this tool for escalated enforcement.



# Enhancement Advantages



## This amended enforcement tool:

- Adds an additional level of enforcement for Code Compliance and the City Attorney's Office;
- Provides property owner's an additional opportunity to comply with city code before litigation becomes the only option;
- Creates a means for recovering costs associated with habitual code violations;
- Improves the quality of life for residents and patrons.



# **Next Steps**



Seek Council approval to amend Article VIII, "Habitual Criminal & Nuisance Properties," of Chapter 27 of the Dallas City Code to include Minimum Property Standards.

- Fair chance hiring, or "ban the box" ordinances prohibit an employer with 15 or more employees from inquiring about an applicant's criminal history on an initial job application.
- Exceptions:
  - State and federal government.
  - Organizations that are exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
  - Employment positions where criminal history can disqualify an applicant by law.





- Fair chance hiring policies have been adopted by 37 states and over 150 cities and counties.
  - Texas jurisdictions with fair chance hiring policies for public employees:
    - Dallas County
    - Travis County
    - Harris County
    - San Antonio
  - Two Texas cities have adopted fair chance hiring ordinances that apply to private employers:
    - Austin (2016)
    - DeSoto (2021)





- Under the Austin and DeSoto ordinances:
  - An applicant may file a complaint with the city.
  - The city conducts an investigation and, if a violation is found, will issue a notice of violation.
  - If a notice of violation is issued, the city will conduct an administrative hearing to determine liability.
  - If the administrative hearing determines the employer is liable, the employer is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$500.

An ordinance amending Chapter 21, "Reserved," of the Dallas City Code; providing fair chance hiring regulations; providing a penalty not to exceed \$500; providing a saving clause; providing a severability clause; and providing an effective date.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DALLAS:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 21, "Reserved," of the Dallas City Code is amended to read as follows:

#### "CHAPTER 21

## FAIR CHANCE HIRING [RESERVED]

## SEC. 21-1. DEFINITIONS.

In this chapter:

- (1) APPLICANT means an individual who submits an initial job application or other documentation for employment.
  - (2) CITY means the City of Dallas, Texas.
- (3) CONVICTION means a record from any jurisdiction that includes information indicating that a person has been convicted of a felony or misdemeanor, provided that the conviction is one for which the person has been placed on probation, deferred disposition, fined, imprisoned, pardoned, or paroled.
- (4) <u>CRIMINAL HISTORY means an arrest, conviction, plea of nolo contendere, or deferred adjudication arising from a felony criminal accusation, or a Class A or Class B misdemeanor criminal accusation, made under state law, federal law, or a comparable law of another state of the United States.</u>
- (5) <u>DEPARTMENT means the department designated by the city manager to implement, administer, and enforce this chapter.</u>

- (6) <u>DIRECTOR</u> means the director of the department or the director's <u>designated representative.</u>
- (7) EMPLOYER means a person, company, corporation, firm, labor organization, or association that employs at least 15 individuals who worked in the city each working day for 20 or more calendar weeks in the current or preceding calendar year. The term includes an agency acting on behalf of an employer. The term also includes the city. The term does not include:
- (A) the United States government, any of its departments or agencies, or any corporation wholly owned by it;
- (B) the government of the State of Texas or any of its departments, agencies, or political subdivisions; or
- (C) an organization that is exempt from taxation under Section 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- (8) EMPLOYMENT means to work for an employer for pay. The term includes full time work, part time work, temporary or seasonal work, contract work, casual or contingent work, work through the services of a temporary or other employment agency, and participation in a vocational, apprenticeship, or educational training program.
- (9) <u>INITIAL JOB APPLICATION means the first written or oral expression of interest in a job by an individual made in compliance with the employer's established criteria for receiving expressions of interest.</u>
- (10) JOB means an employment position with an employer for which the employer has solicited or accepted applications and which the employer is currently attempting to fill.

## SEC. 21-2. APPLICABILITY.

- (a) Except as provided in this chapter, this chapter applies to all employers in the city.
- (b) This chapter does not apply to an employment position for which an individual may be disqualified based on the individual's criminal history under a federal, state, or local law, pursuant to a federal, state, or local agency or commission rule or regulation, or compliance with a legally mandated insurance or bond requirement.
- (c) Nothing in this chapter limits an employer's authority to make a hiring decision for any lawful reason, including the determination that an individual is unsuitable for the job based on an individualized assessment of the individual's criminal history.
- (d) Nothing in this chapter limits an employer's authority to post a list of criminal convictions that disqualify an applicant from employment.

## SEC. 21-3. CRIMINAL HISTORY IN EMPLOYMENT.

An employer commits a violation if the employer inquires about an applicant's criminal history on an initial job application.

## SEC. 21-4. INVESTIGATION.

- (a) An applicant may file a complaint with the department and the department may investigate complaints alleging a violation of this chapter.
- (b) A complaint alleging a violation of this chapter must be filed with the department by or on behalf of an aggrieved applicant within 60 days of the date of the violation. A complaint must contain the following information:
  - (1) the employer's name;
  - (2) the employer's location;
- (3) a copy of the job application form alleged to be in violation of this chapter; and
- (4) any additional information requested by the department to investigate the complaint.
- (c) Upon investigation by the department and a determination of a violation under this chapter, the violator will be issued an administrative citation in accordance with Article IV-b of Chapter 27 of this code.

## SEC. 21-5. ENFORCEMENT.

- (a) The city may impose administrative penalties, fees, and court costs in accordance with Article IV-b of Chapter 27 of this code for an offense under Section 21-3.
- (b) For a first violation of this chapter, the director shall issue a written warning to the employer found to be in violation informing the employer that a civil penalty may be assessed for a subsequent violation.
- (c) An employer found to be in violation of this chapter after receiving a written warning is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$500 for each subsequent violation.
- (d) The provisions of Article IV-b of Chapter 27 of this code pertaining to financial inability to comply with an administrative order do not apply to violations of this chapter."
- SECTION 2. That a person violating a provision of this ordinance, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

SECTION 3. That Chapter 21 of the Dallas City Code shall remain in full force and effect,

save and except as amended by this ordinance.

SECTION 4. That any act done or right vested or accrued, or any proceeding, suit, or

prosecution had or commenced in any action before the amendment or repeal of any ordinance, or

part thereof, shall not be affected or impaired by amendment or repeal of any ordinance, or part

thereof, and shall be treated as still remaining in full force and effect for all intents and purposes

as if the amended or repealed ordinance, or part thereof, had remained in force.

SECTION 5. That the terms and provisions of this ordinance are severable and are

governed by Section 1-4 of Chapter 1 of the Dallas City Code, as amended.

SECTION 6. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage

and publication in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Dallas, and it is

accordingly so ordained.

Dallas 311 Interactive Citywide Service Request Dashboard

The Office of Data and Analytics and Business Intelligence (DBI) in partnership with Dallas 311 has developed an interactive 311 Citywide Dashboard that provides a convenient and accessible way for residents to engage with and explore 311 service requests. The dashboard tool provides insight on the volume, time, and locations of service requests used to improve the quality of life for the residents of Dallas.

The 311 Citywide Dashboard displays selections filterable by date, department, service request type and displays key measures regarding service level status (i.e., on time or overdue) and the number of service requests created daily. Charts and maps display and highlight where service requests are located along with details such as council district, service request type, day of the week, and hour. Each view is interactive, allows viewers to see which locations receive the most service requests, and to highlight council districts.

DBI anticipates releasing this interactive performance tool to be hosted on the Dallas 311 website in the next few weeks, pending committee feedback.

Staff is providing a briefing to the Quality of Life, Arts and Culture Committee to solicit any feedback you may have about the dashboard as we prepare to launch this product. ## BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DALLAS:

**SECTION 1.** That the President of the Park and Recreation Board and the City Manger are hereby authorized to execute an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement with Dallas Independent School District, approved as to form by the City Attorney, to maximize resources and programming opportunities for both Dallas Park & Recreation Department and Dallas Independent School District students by ensuring mutual use of City of Dallas and Dallas Independent School District athletic facilities through July 31, 2027.

**SECTION 2.** That the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement shall begin upon execution and expire on July 31, 2027 and include the following provisions:

- The City of Dallas will waive green fees and tournament reservation fees of district participants for all the golf activities and University Interscholastic League District Golf Tournaments scheduled annually in between March 15th and the end of April.
- Dallas Independent School District shall pay the following tennis fees for district tournaments at the following centers listed below:

Tenison Golf Course	\$3.00 per court player
Stevens Golf Course	\$3.00 per court player

Dallas Independent School District and the City of Dallas Park & Recreation Department will track and report annual usage as part of the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement.

**SECTION 3.** That this contract is designated as Contract No. PKR-2022-00018849.

**SECTION 4.** That this resolution shall take effect immediately from and after its passage in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Dallas, and it is accordingly so resolved.
