If the presiding officer fails to act, any member of the City Council may move to require enforcement of the rules, and the affirmative vote of a majority of the City Council shall require the presiding officer to act." SUBJECT Good Jobs for Good Airports Act Update

On March 20, the Service Employees International Union (SEIU) presented a briefing regarding current airport service workers compensation and federal legislation that would compel higher wages for airport tenants, contractors, and subcontractors using the airport facilities. On June 12th, the Office of Government Affairs provided <u>an update</u> on the Good Jobs for Good Airports legislation.

Bill Summary and Status

The initial legislation was introduced on March 9th in both the House (H.R. 1499) and Senate (S. 753). An updated version has not yet been formally introduced but would require airlines and concessionaires to serve as certifying agents on the regulation of wages and benefits provided to their employees. In the previous version of the bill, airports were included as certifying agents, but have since been removed. Noncompliance with the new federal minimum wage and benefit standards would result in civil fines. Airports Council International-North American (ACI-NA) is neutral on this updated version of the bill.

Senator Markey and Representative Garcia are still expected to formally introduce new versions of the bill. As previously reported, if the updated legislation is to move, it may likely be as part of the broader FAA reauthorization bill. A short-term FAA reauthorization bill was passed on September 30th, extending the authorities of the FAA through December 31st, 2023. Passing a long-term reauthorization is a focus of many legislators, and protections for workers like those proposed as part of the Good Jobs for Good Airports may be a major sticking point.

The city maintains its recommendation of a neutral position on the bill, based on the information we have today.

The City remains committed to fair and living wages for Dallas workers and those employed with our partner organizations in which the City has a vested interest. An Overview of the Deployment of Autonomous Vehicles within the City of Dallas by Cruise LLC

Back in spring 2023, the city of Dallas (COD) was contacted by Cruise LLC (Cruise) informing us of their intent to launch their operation in limited areas of COD. As a result of the notification, we initiated an internal working group consisting of representatives of several city departments including DPD, DFR, DDOT, IT, CAO and City Marshall office. Concurrently, Cruise has been in contact with staff and with some council members to provide them with background information about Cruise, their planned launch in Dallas and a map showing their initial launch areas. As a result of this outreach effort, staff coordinated with Cruise about an initial high-level training for first responders which took place on Friday October 6, 2023 coupled with an initial briefing to the City's Public Safety (PS) committee on October 10, 2023. A few questions came up during the discussion that will be followed up with a memo to the PS committee at a later date.

In this regard, attached with this memo a copy of the presentation that was included in the PS briefing covering the summary of the safety training as well the other presentation that was initially intended to be presented which includes the proposed maps of the initial launch area.

Types of Automation

Driver-Assist(also known as ADAS)

The human in the vehicle is required to be licensed, attentive, and ready to take over the driving task at any moment.

Technologies include:

- Lane-keeping assistance
- Automatic emergency braking
- Adaptive cruise control
- Forward collision warning

Autonomous Vehicle (AV) (also known as ADS)

When in autonomous mode, passengers in the vehicle have no expectation of having to do any driving tasks, whether there are driver controls or not.

Examples of AVs include:

- Cruise Origin
- Cruise AV (Chevy Bolt-vehicle)
- No vehicle with ADS is available for individual purchase at this time.

Vehicles have support features that provide limited warnings or momentary assistance. Examples include automatic emergency braking or blind spot warning.

Technology features include steering or brake/acceleration support for drivers. Examples include adaptive cruise control or lane centering.

Technology features include steering and brake/acceleration support for drivers. Examples include a combination of adaptive cruise control and lane centering.

At this level, the vehicle can perform driving tasks, driving in a traffic jam for example, but the driver must be prepared to take over when the vehicle requests, at any time.

Here, the vehicle is doing all driving tasks, and passengers cannot take over the driving task. The vehicle is limited to set conditions – either in geography, time of day, or weather conditions.

Finally, at this level, the vehicle can drive itself in all conditions and geographies.





SUBJECT Infrastructure Fee Considerations

Background

Through the development of the 2024 Bond Program, City staff has identified a \$17B Infrastructure and Facilities Needs Inventory. Just over half of the \$17B Needs Inventory consists of \$8.6B in streets and transportation needs. Understanding that the 2017 Bond Program was \$1.05B and the 2024 Bond Program is projected to be \$1.1B, City staff has been evaluating alternative funding sources to support the City's streets (streets, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, etc.) and transportation (traffic signals, streetlights, turn lanes, etc.) infrastructure.

Given the background provided above, the purpose of this memorandum is to discuss potential funding sources that City staff has considered as potential supplements to the current funds being invested in the City of Dallas' streets and transportation infrastructure.

Street and Transportation Impact Fee

Street and Transportation Impact Fees are one-time charges paid by developers that help pay for construction cost of capital improvements, expansion, as well as other transportation infrastructure improvements, and are a fair and equitable way to finance specific activities related to disturbance of city assets and road conditions and could help with the funding gap between the City's needs and its resources.

Street impact fees are authorized by Chapter 395 of the Texas Local Government Code (Established in 1987) and have several benefits ensuring that new development does not place an undue burden on existing taxpayers. Additionally, street impact fees can help to promote sustainable development by encouraging developers to build in areas with existing infrastructure.

The following Texas cities have adopted the Street Impact Fee in their process:

Pavement Degradation Fee/Street Cut Fee

A Pavement Degradation or Street Cut Fee could be charged as a method for the City of Dallas to recover the costs associated with a decrease in the useful life of any paved rights-of-way caused by excavation or other disturbance. This fee could be assessed not only for excavations but for deteriorated pavement, sidewalks, or alleys, affected by adjacent development.

Cities that have implemented pavement degradation or street cut fees include:

- Anaheim, CA,
- Chicago, IL,
- Toronto, CA.

Alley Sanitation Pickup Fee

The cost for Sanitation pickup in alleys is more expensive than street pickup. The increased cost for alley pickup is attributed to not being able to use automated trucks due to space constraints in the alleys, increased wear and tear on Sanitation trucks, and greater deterioration of the alley pavement. This fee would be assessed to Sanitation customers not wanting to convert to street Sanitation pickup.

Throughout FY 2024, City staff will begin developing these fees with a goal of having recommendations prepared for the Proposed FY 2025 Budget. Fee development will include the appropriate stakeholder input and for those fees that will require a consultant to develop, a funding plan will need to be considered. Performance Notes:

Public Works had 1,646 projects planned for FY 2023 and as of September 2023, of those projects, 1,653 or **100.4%** have been completed. Of the total \$189.3M programmed dollars for FY 2023, as of September 2023, Public Works expended approximately \$122.7M or 64.8% of total budget.

FY23 Sidewalk IMP Update

From the total sidewalk projects, PBW completed 14 projects. One (1) project was canceled due to some conflict, and the remaining 2 projects had a federal funding (CDBG), which current contract had no provision to allow for federal funding; however, a new contract is being processed to include the CDBG funding that we can complete the remaining two (2) projects. Please note that the contract for sidewalk is a multi-year contract.

Given this overview of Public Works' efforts through September 2023, the October 2023 update of this report will be provided in November 2023 and subsequent reports will follow each month.
