Rules of Courtesy

City Council meetings bring together citizens of many varied interests and ideas. To insure fairness and orderly meetings, the Council has adopted rules of courtesy which apply to all members of the Council, administrative staff, news media, citizens and visitors. These procedures provide:

- That no one shall delay or interrupt the proceedings, or refuse to obey the orders of the presiding officer.
- All persons should refrain from private conversation, eating, drinking and smoking while in the Council Chamber.
- Posters or placards must remain outside the Council Chamber.
- No cellular phones or audible beepers allowed in Council Chamber while City Council is in session.

"Citizens and other visitors attending City Council meetings shall observe the same rules of propriety, decorum and good conduct applicable to members of the City Council. Any person making personal, impertinent, profane or slanderous remarks or who becomes boisterous while addressing the City Council or while attending the City Council meeting shall be removed from the room if the sergeant-at-arms is so directed by the presiding officer, and the person shall be barred from further audience before the City Council during that session of the City Council. If the presiding officer fails to act, any member of the City Council may move to require enforcement of the rules, and the affirmative vote of a majority of the City Council shall require the presiding officer to act." Section 3.3(c) of the City Council Rules of Procedure.

"Pursuant to Section 46.03, Penal Code (places weapons prohibited), a person may not carry a firearm or other weapon into any open meeting on this property."

Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR), endeavors to successfully recruit and retain qualified members to ensure continued excellent service delivery to the residents of Dallas. Please accept this memorandum as an update on the current efforts of the DFR Recruiting and Retention Division.

DFR employs several different strategies for recruitment:

- Social Media
 - Facebook (8.6k followers)
 - 12 recruiting posts in the last 90 days have reached nearly 18k accounts
 - Instagram (2.3k followers)
 - 17 recruiting posts and stories in the last 90 days have reached nearly 4.5k accounts
- Recruiting Website
 - Over 300 direct scans of dynamic QR codes to help build our recruiting "interest list"
- Recruiting Trips and Events
 - So far in 2023, DFR Recruiting has made 35 visits to colleges, job fairs, and events.

Background/History



- Training operations began at "temporary" Academy located in a leased facility at 5310 Red Bird Center Drive in July 1990
- Expanded in-service training operations to 5610 Red Bird Center Drive in 2012
- Current Basic Training Academy lease expires July 2027





Background/History



- June 2021- Executed a Memorandum of Understanding with the University of North Texas at Dallas to begin working towards a new Dallas Police Academy that meets the needs of the Department and the community
- Benefits of joint project between DPD and UNTD include:
 - 21st century style state of the art training facility
 - True higher education environment
 - Expanded hiring and retention
 - Reduced cost to City for land and infrastructure



Purpose



- Provide an update on the status of the Dallas Police Academy project including:
 - Current status of project
 - General timeline
 - Next steps







- Secured 20 million in funding from State of Texas
- Requested 50 million as part of the 2024 Bond Package
- Private fundraising continues
- City and UNTD are negotiating a preliminary ground lease with the following items as guiding objectives:
 - Terms may change prior to being finalized.
 - Use of approx. 5-acres on UNTD Campus with potential of shared use of adjacent park land
 - Forty-year lease with four ten-year renewal options





Background/History



- Emergency alerts and warnings are distinct elements within the larger city crisis communication strategy
- Alerting technology has improved significantly
- Each alerting method is one "tool in the toolbox" that must be used in coordination with others
- Challenges remain in ensuring alerts and warnings are equitable and inclusive



Purpose



- Describe the alert and warning systems that are available to the City of Dallas
- Explain the circumstances in which they may be used
- Identify opportunities and next steps that will strengthen our alerting capabilities



General Alerting Protocols



- Office of Emergency Management (OEM)
 Standard Operating Procedures dictate how
 OEM disseminates alerts
- OEM never relies on a single method of notification
- Clear, concise, and effective emergency messaging is key to eliciting desired protective measures by the public
- Alerts are always, at a minimum, issued in Spanish and English





Emergency Notification System (DallasAlert)



- Opt-in notification system that collects:
 - Email
 - Cell phone
 - Address
- Residents sign up through a registration portal
- Despite heavy marketing, opt-in rate is less than 1% (~10,000 registrants)
- Includes Reverse 9-1-1, which can target landlines only





City Employee Notification System (CENS)



- Utilized as a mass notification tool for enrolled city employees
- Also utilized to activate special teams:
 - SWAT
 - DPD Non-Fatal Shooting Team
 - Emergency Operations Center activation
- Notifies special groups:
 - Mayor and City Council
 - Utility Outages






Integrated Public Alert and Warnings System (IPAWS)



- Unifies several Federal alerting systems into a single platform
 - Emergency Alert System
 - National Warning System
 - Wireless Emergency Alerts
 - NOAA Weather Radio
- Organized and funded by the Federal Emergency Management Agency
- Majority of alerts are issued by the National Weather Service

Activation Criteria

- Impending natural or human-made disaster or threat
- Dangerous or missing person (Blue Alert, Amber Alert)






IPAWS (Cont.)



Wireless Emergency Alerts

- Geotargeted 90- or 360-character messages to cell phones
- Does not require opt-in, but users can turn alerts off
- Supports Spanish-language messages
- Weather alerts are issued by the National Weather Service
- OEM tests on the first Wednesday of the month in the IPAWS lab
 - Lab tests do not alert the public
 - Dallas has conducted two live tests (2018, 2019)
- Utilized during the 2020 George Floyd protests to issue curfew notice

Emergency Alert System


- National public warning system that requires radio and TV broadcasters, cable TV, wireless cable systems, satellite and wireline operators to provide the President with capability to address the American people within 10 minutes during a national emergency.
- Typically utilized when a warning covers a large geographical footprint
- Different broadcasters may display alerts differently depending on their policies



National Public Warning System Stations



- Radio broadcast stations that work with FEMA to provide emergency alert and warnings
- Fully equipped shelter capable of withstanding all hazards, while providing for human survival during crisis for 60 days
- Utilizes the 820 AM radio frequency and allows for live broadcast during disasters
- FEMA provides training to local emergency managers on how to utilize this equipment in a catastrophic event





Outdoor Warning System (OWS)



- 178 sirens strategically installed throughout the city
- Intended to warn individuals outside to seek shelter and additional information
- Tested on the first Wednesday of the month at noon

Activation Criteria

- Tornado Warning or spotter confirmed tornado
- Sustained winds ≥ 70 mph
- Hail > 1.5"
- Hazardous Materials release





Social Media



- Utilized to promote preparedness, but critical during response
- Collaborated with COM to produce hazard-specific graphics in top five Dallas languages
- Weather alerts are automatically posted
- OEM always posts WHY sirens activated
























Opportunities and Next Steps



- Before the contract ends on October 31, 2024, OEM will continue to identify ways to strengthen and broaden our alerting capabilities:
 - DeafLink: Accessible communications for persons with sensory disabilities who may be Deaf, Hard of Hearing, Deaf-Blind, or literacy challenged
- Transition from current notification software to Rave Alert:
 - Enhances existing capabilities and adds new features
 - Integrates with city Active Directory to ensure all employees can receive alerts
- Explore opportunities and partnerships to reach residents who are not already engaged with city communication platforms



GRID IMPACT RESULTS — OVERALL CRIME








GRID CRIME BY THE NUMBERS (Incidents)




PNI Operations since July 2022




- In 2021 over 80,000 people in the US died from opioid involved overdoses

- So far, fentanyl has caused or contributed to the death of more than 260 people in Dallas County in 2023






Specialized Two-Person Response Team

- One DFR Paramedic and one Recovery Support Peer Specialist from Recovery Resource Council
- Non-emergency response
- Connect patients to services to support treatment and recovery
- Currently operates four days per week





- Target population is any individual within response area of DFR who has experienced and survived a drug-related overdose
- Clients are located through:
 - Previous Interactions
 - 911 dispatch information
 - Referrals from law enforcement





Figure 1. 12 Month-ending Provisional Counts of Drug Overdose Deaths for Dallas County, Texas





Figure 1. 12 Month-ending Provisional Counts of Drug Overdose Deaths for Collin County, Texas




- Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR) and the Office of the Medical Director (OMD) collaborated in the expansion of the EMS Quality Management Program (QMP)
- With the approval of Council, the QMP has expanded to include a Chief Medical Director, 3 Deputy Medical Directors, a Quality Management Coordinator, 3 Quality Management Specialists, a Clinical Practice Manager, and 4 Clinical Practice Specialists.
- The QMP works to ensure DFR members consistently provide "Excellence in Care" by evaluating system and personnel performance and identifying opportunities for improvement as well as recognizing exemplary performance.
- Clinical improvement is focused on education, training, and mentoring using data that measures improvement in service.



Data - Patient Transport Rate



















SUBJECT Dallas Fire-Rescue's Public Safety Dashboard for October 2023

Dallas Fire-Rescue total dispatched incident numbers for the month of September were 23,835, down from 23,940 in August. As you are aware, DFR has a stated goal of 90% achievement for the metrics of EMS response within 9 minutes and Structure Fire Response within 5:20. The EMS metric remained below our targets at 84%, which is a slight decrease in performance from September. The Fire metric was also decreased, down to 85%. We will continue to analyze the data and adjust resources and strategies as necessary to achieve our target goals.

We had 5 significant fires for the month of October, which was up from the 3 we had in September. Our inspections decreased but our re-inspections increased. Our rescue unit hours of utilization (UHU) numbers are at 35.7% overall, which was down 2.3% from the previous reporting period, continuing that positive trend.

We currently have 144 recruits in various stages of Training. All those recruits will be assigned to the field over the next year.

Municipal Court Budget









Defendant's Cumulative Response Rate Looking Back 23, 90 & 180 Days







Update Regarding DFR Blocker Apparatus Program to Protect Emergency Responders at the Scene of Highway Accidents

Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR) places safety at the forefront of priorities. Among the most dangerous response components for first responders are incidents on freeways and highways. As you are aware, DFR implemented a Blocker Program beginning in 2019 to improve the safety of operations during emergency response to major thoroughfares throughout the city of Dallas. Please accept this memorandum as an update on the current status of the program as well as plans for expansion.

The original apparatus utilized as blockers were three out of service Fire Engines that were retrofitted with safety signage and arrow boards for traffic control and filled with sand for collision absorption. Of the original three, one unit is still in service (one was lost due to catastrophic collision damage and the other from mechanical failure).

To augment the original blocker, DFR recently purchased three attenuator type blocker vehicles. These were procured through a \$300,000 grant from the Texas Department of Transportation. Currently, these units are in the final stages of completion (markings, equipment, etc.). After procedures and personnel training are completed, these units are expected to be placed in service Monday, November 27th. DFR is currently pursuing a three-year maintenance contract for these units, and is expected to be submitted to Council for final approval in December.

Additionally, DFR is collaborating with the Dallas Police Department (DPD) to create a plan to utilize both department's existing Blocker vehicle resources in the most efficient manner possible and provide a wider range of response capabilities of the Blocker units.

Finally, DFR is currently partnering with the Police and Aviation Departments in the creation of a new pilot program to evaluate the possibility of utilizing wrecker company vendors to provide Blocker Vehicles for traffic management. This will allow expansion of the blocker program and increase safety for first responders and residents. A Request for Proposals (RFP) draft is in development with a target date for pilot program launch of mid-2024. The goal of this program is to provide Blocker services city-wide.

SUBJECT Dallas Fire-Rescue Facility Construction Update

Please accept this memorandum as an update to the ongoing construction projects involving fire stations through a collaboration between Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR) and the Office of Bond and Construction Management (BCM), Office of Economic Development (ECO), and construction contractors:

- Station 41 (5920 Royal Ln) Construction is ongoing. Installation of windows and completion of concrete work, interior walls and framing, and ceilings will be completed in November. Plumbing, mechanical, electrical, finish outs, and all permitting are scheduled to be completed in December. It is now anticipated that the station will be open and operational in mid-January 2024.
- 2. Fire Station 16 (2616 Chalk Hill Rd) Kitchen remodel is complete.
- 3. Fire Station 22 (12200 Coit Rd) Abatement of lead paint began on October 30th and is expected to last 8 weeks. Completion is scheduled for the end of December.
- 4. Fire Station 56 (7040 Belt Line Rd) Kitchen remodel will be completed once delivery of cabinets and countertops is received. No ETA is currently available.
- 5. Fire Station 57 (10801 Audelia Rd) After the completion of the station's HVAC project, there are several ceiling tiles that need replacement. Installation should be completed within the next two weeks.
- 6. Station 27 (8401 Douglas Ave) flooding in the station after recent heavy rains is currently being addressed. DFR is meeting with Storm Water to determine if construction in the area caused blockages in the storm water system. Further updates will be provided as information becomes available.

Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR), to provide excellent service delivery to the residents of the City of Dallas, strives to maintain adequate resources to allow for efficient and effective emergency response. Please accept this memorandum as an update to the status of the DFR emergency fleet.

The status of emergency apparatus, as of October 25th, 2023, is as follows:

To address potential apparatus shortages and minimize negative effects on departmental operations, DFR has developed and deployed various strategies. The utilization of rental agreements has provided additional resources. The Squad Program places personnel assigned to heavy apparatus (engines and trucks) which are out of service for repairs on light weight vehicles with a modified response plan to mitigate gaps in emergency response coverage. In the very near future, a Medic Squad program will be launched,

which will be similar in design to the Squad Program for heavy apparatus: Lightweight vehicles will be staffed by personnel assigned to Rescues out of service for repairs with modified response plans to mitigate gaps in emergency response coverage.

DFR's fleet maintenance program has evolved to include a more aggressive and comprehensive preventative maintenance plan for all apparatus, a stronger driver safety program, and the deployment of three grant-funded blocker vehicles (anticipated inservice November '23) to increase safety on incidents occurring on major thoroughfares.

Optimally, DFR strives to maintain not only a full fleet of front-line apparatus, but also a minimum 15% reserve fleet for each unit type. Unfortunately, DFR's Fleet Maintenance Division has been severely challenged to meet this goal due to a myriad of obstacles including global supply chain issues for both repair parts and replacement units, motor vehicle collisions involving apparatus, and maintenance staffing vacancies.

To address staffing concerns, DFR has strengthened its mechanic technician recruitment and retention through expanded recruitment sources and partnerships, improved salary scales, improved training, and a robust succession plan.

DFR anticipates that through the above plans and programs, any negative operational effects from fleet shortages will be avoided. It is our expectation that the resulting improved operational, training, and staffing plans will aid in further protecting the status of our emergency fleet for years to come.
