#### **Rules of Courtesy**

City Council meetings bring together citizens of many varied interests and ideas. To insure fairness and orderly meetings, the Council has adopted rules of courtesy which apply to all members of the Council, administrative staff, news media, citizens and visitors. These procedures provide:

- That no one shall delay or interrupt the proceedings, or refuse to obey the orders of the presiding officer.
- All persons should refrain from private conversation, eating, drinking and smoking while in the Council Chamber.
- Posters or placards must remain outside the Council Chamber.
- No cellular phones or audible beepers allowed in Council Chamber while City Council is in session.

"Citizens and other visitors attending City Council meetings shall observe the same rules of propriety, decorum and good conduct applicable to members of the City Council. Any person making personal, impertinent, profane or slanderous remarks or who becomes boisterous while addressing the City Council or while attending the City Council meeting shall be removed from the room if the sergeant-at-arms is so directed by the presiding officer, and the person shall be barred from further audience before the City Council during that session of the City Council. If the presiding officer fails to act, any member of the City Council may move to require enforcement of the rules, and the affirmative vote of a majority of the City Council shall require the presiding officer to act." Section 3.3(c) of the City Council Rules of Procedure.










#### GRID CRIME BY THE NUMBERS (Incidents)











- 2. Conduct preliminary site visits and collect baseline information;
- 3. Develop intervention activities for relevant stakeholders;
- 4. Build workplans to track progress and evaluate work;
- 5. Implement interventions and monitor progress consistently; and
- 6. Provide recommendations to property owner for sustainment and follow-up on progress.



#### CRIME PLAN — NEXT STEPS



- Phase 13 Grids Began on December 1st
  - Period 13 deployed 63 grids
- Place Network Investigations
  - Begins with a problem-focused investigation designed to uncover, identify, and disrupt the criminal networks that contribute to the violent crime in Dallas.
  - The PNI Board is made up with stakeholder government agencies such as, Office of Integrated Public Solutions, Code Enforcement, and Parks and Recreation. The Board is designed to work together to address crime and it's causes within the crime place network.



# Single Function Paramedic Launch



- In May of 2023, Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR) hired the first class of Single Function Paramedics (SFP).
- Training and orientation for new SFP hires is 8 weeks, significantly shorter than the traditional training program for Fire-Rescue Officers.
- New SFP hires are all from Texas, with most coming from private sector EMS providers or hospitals.
- One hire retired from a suburban fire department and stated the work schedule was a driving factor.



# Single Function Paramedic Current Status



- SFP Rescues are staffed 7 days a week from 10am-10pm.
- 6 SFP Rescues are currently in service
- Home Station Locations:
  - R70 Station 25, 2112 56th Street
  - R71 Station 36, 2300 Singleton Blvd
  - R72 Station 38, 2839 Wilhurt Ave
  - R73 Station 48, 10480 Northwest Highway
  - R75 Station 05, 2039 N. St. Augustine Drive
  - R76 Station 12, 7520 W. Wheatland Road



## Single Function Paramedic Staffing



- Each SFP Rescue requires 4 personnel to be fully staffed.
- Current Program Staffing:
  - 17 Paramedics in the field
  - 4 Paramedics in training



## Single Function Paramedic Results



- During the program pilot, SFP Rescues averaged over 7 responses in a 12-hour period.
- SFP Rescues have helped make positive impact to DFR performance metrics, most notably improvements to response times and unit hours of utilization rates.
- The SFP Program helps address increased call volume during peak hours while providing a new recruiting avenue for the new career path.



## Single Function Paramedic Next Steps



- By the Summer of 2024:
  - Expand SFP Rescues from 6 to 8
  - Maintain a total staff 32 SFPs
    - 6 Paramedics starting February 2024
    - 5 Paramedics starting Summer 2024
- Current projections are that once the SFP Program expands to 8 Rescues, they will make over 20,000 responses annually.
- DFR will continue to monitor impact of SFP Program to determine best next steps to ensure the efficient and effective emergency response



## Welfare Crisis Response Team Launch



- The Six-month pilot of the Welfare Crisis Response Team (WCRT) was formed through a partnership between Integrated Public Safety (IPS) and Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR) as an alternative response solution used to improve service and reduce the demand on emergency resources.
- Pilot has been centered in the Central Business District (CBD).
- The Pilot launched September 12<sup>th</sup> and is staffed by a DFR Paramedic and a Crisis Coordinator from IPS.



## Welfare Crisis Response Team Early Data



- The team operates Monday-Friday from 8am-8pm.
- The team is currently averaging over 8 responses per 12-hour period.
- Only 15% of incidents involving the WCRT result in a patient transport.
- Overall, response volume for frontline DFR units located in the CBD is currently down over 14% when the WCRT is in service.



## Welfare Crisis Response Team Early Data



 Since the launch, the Crisis Coordinator has provided 92 social service referrals.

- Identified Issues for Clients
  - Substance Abuse
  - Housing/Shelter
  - Food
  - Mental Health
  - Medical Care
  - Suspected Human Trafficking





## Welfare Crisis Response Team Next Steps



- DFR and IPS Leadership will continue to monitor team activity and service outcomes through team activity logs. Information tracked will include:
  - Gained efficiencies for DFR Apparatus
  - Incident totals and types
  - Relevant data on residents encountered
  - Incident dispositions
  - Follow up services utilized
- Early data shows the program has the potential to provide the most appropriate services to the most vulnerable population and reduce DFR call volume in the CBD.

- Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR) is considering changes to its promotional process and standards to improve performance in the following areas:
  - Employee Recruitment and Retention
  - Operational Effectiveness
  - Leadership Development
  - Employee Morale





- This project has involved
  - Collaboration between:
    - DFR leadership
    - Civil Service Department (CVS)
    - Employee Associations
  - Research into industry best practices from comparable departments





- Some changes are necessary to:
  - Allow for new positions
  - Ensure that the requirements and testing process for new hires are efficient and in line with industry standards
- Currently, the section of the Civil Service Rules governing DFR's promotional process contains language is confusing and lacks consistency.
- DFR's current standards for promotion are not in line with industry best practices and allow for situations that result in inconsistencies.



## Scope of Proposed Changes



- Overall review of language for consistency and clarity.
- Ensure that all requirements for new hires are in line with current industry standards
- Review testing procedures for new hires and address any identified areas of improvement
- Provide language for the allowance of additional new future positions.



## **Scope of Proposed Changes**



- The current rules allow employees on probation to test for promotion.
  - The employee would not be eligible for promotion until after successful completion of the probationary period.
  - This language is inconsistent with other sections of the Civil Service Rules and introduces the potential for problematic testing processes and results.
  - DFR is proposing language that precludes probationary members from eligibility for promotional tests



## Scope of Proposed Changes



- Current industry best practices for the required time in rank to be eligible to test for promotion is two years.
  - DFR's current standards are not in line with industry best practices and inconsistent with each other.
  - DFR is proposing a uniform standard (two years in each rank) and consistent language for all promotional opportunities.



## Civil Service Rule Revision Road Map



- January '24 DFR presents recommended changes to CVS
- February '24 CVS Staff validates, and benchmarks proposed changes
  - Normally takes 4-6 weeks
- April '24 CVS Board briefed on proposed changes

   Comment Period

DFR Promotional Standards Proposed Language Changes:

#### • All Ranks:

- **Current:** Those candidates who will meet the eligibility criteria for any promotional rank prior to six months following the administration of an examination may compete on that examination but will not be eligible for promotion to the higher rank until they have successfully completed the service requirements for promotion referenced in this section.
- Proposed: Delete this section.





- Driver-Engineer / Senior Fire Prevention Officer
  - **Current:** Fire-rescue department employees who have completed two years of service after completing probation as a fire-rescue / fire prevention officer shall be eligible to test for promotion.
  - **Proposed:** Fire-rescue department employees who have completed 24 months of service as a fire rescue / fire prevention officer, and are not on probation for any reason, shall be eligible to test for promotion.





- Fire / Fire Prevention Lieutenant
  - **Current:** Fire rescue department employees who have served in the department four years and who have served as a Driver-Engineer / Senior Fire Prevention Officer shall be eligible for promotion.
  - **Proposed:** Fire-rescue department employees who have completed 24 months of service as a Driver-Engineer / Senior Fire Prevention Officer, and are not on probation for any reason, shall be eligible to test for promotion.





- Fire / Fire Prevention Captain
  - Current: Fire-rescue department employees who have served as Fire / Fire Prevention Lieutenant for twenty-four months shall be eligible to test for promotion
  - **Proposed:** Fire-rescue department employees who have served as Fire / Fire Prevention Lieutenant for twenty-four months, and are not on probation for any reason, shall be eligible to test for promotion.





- Fire / Fire Prevention Battalion or Section Chief
  - **Current:** Fire-rescue department employees who have served in the department for seven years and who have served as a Fire / Fire Prevention Captain shall be eligible for promotion.
  - Proposed: Fire-rescue employees who have served as a Fire /
    Fire Prevention Captain, and are not on probation for any
    reason, shall be eligible to test for promotion.

- Dallas Police Department (DPD) and Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR) routinely receive requests to honor first responders at the location where the employee lost his or her life serving the citizens of Dallas in the line of duty.
- On May 5<sup>th</sup>, 2022, the Public Safety Committee was briefed on this project and provided input.





- Dallas Fire-Rescue has identified 78 firefighters who have died in the line of duty between June 1902 and September 2021
- The Dallas Police Department has identified 92 officers who have died in the line of duty between May 1892 and January 2022

## **Proposed Process**



- Line of duty deaths will be reviewed internally by DPD / DFR for inclusion in the program. When possible, the review will include collaboration with surviving family.
- Once approved by the department, an application for a first responder street topper will be submitted by the Chief of Police or Fire Chief to the City Manager. The application must include the following:
  - A statement including information regarding the member's name, service time, and death in the line of duty.
  - A map showing the proposed location of the memorial street topper.



## **Proposed Process**




- Once approved by the City Manager:
  - Notification will be made to the Councilperson representing the district in which the topper will be placed
  - The application will be submitted to the Public Safety committee for final approval.
- Once approved by the Public Safety Committee:
  - DPD/DFR will work with the family and Transportation Department to schedule a time for installation.
- First responder street toppers will include the member's name, rank, and "End of Watch" date.

## Implementation Plan



- After approval of new City Ordinance by Public Safety Committee and City Council, DPD and DFR will work with Transportation Department to create initial batch of First Responder Toppers.
  - Street Toppers are intended to be placed in chronological order, beginning with the oldest
  - DPD and DFR are working to find a location for an initial joint ceremony to place the first toppers in honor of a member from each department.
  - The remainder of the initial batch of signs will be unveiled at the same time.
- DPD and DFR will work with Transportation Department and any available surviving family for the creation and installation of remaining and future signs.
  - Subsequent toppers may be unveiled on the anniversary of the member's End of Watch.



## **Next Steps**



- DPD and DFR are currently working with City Attorneys Office on final Draft Ordinance for Public Safety Committee review and approval
- After approval, DPD and DFR will collaborate with the Transportation Department on the creation of initial batch of signs and development of an installation plan.
- DPD and DFR will identify a location for Initial Ceremony to honor our first responders who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

#### **SUBJECT 2025 Proposed Legislative Priorities – Public Safety**

As the City of Dallas prepares for the 89<sup>th</sup> Texas Legislature and 119<sup>th</sup> Congress, both set to convene in 2025, the Office of Government Affairs has been working with peer departments and stakeholders to develop the City's legislative programs for consideration by the City Council.

As an overview, prior to each legislative session, the City Council adopts a state and federal legislative agenda outlining official City of Dallas positions on various legislative issues. Throughout the development process, input is sought from the Mayor and City Council, executive City leadership, City departments, and external organizations. Once adopted, the programs will serve as guiding principles for City elected officials, City staff, and the legislative team engaged in outreach and policy discussions. You can find both the 88th Legislative Program and 118th Congress Legislative Program on the Office of Government Affairs website.

Legislative priorities submitted for consideration as part of the 2025 state and federal legislative programs include:

- Pursue revenue streams that could support future public safety and pension obligations. (State)
- Clarify statutory language supporting police access to less lethal devices. (State)
- Properly align responsibilities and seek funding for school crossing guard programs. (State)
- Seek funding for emergency protection equipment blockers for Emergency Accident Response. (State)
- Consider establishing the Department of Public Safety as the primary first responder on state highways. (State)
- Clarify municipal authority to designate roadways as a High Injury Network (HIN) roadway. (State/Federal)
- Enhance safety for residents of senior facilities. (State)
- Support additional prevention, protections and resources for domestic violence and human trafficking survivors and abusers. (State/Federal)
- Increase funding for re-entry services. (State/Federal)

In addition to the items above, we urge legislative efforts include maintaining existing funding streams at both the state and federal levels.







#### SUBJECT Dallas Fire-Rescue's Public Safety Dashboard for November 2023

Dallas Fire-Rescue total dispatched incident numbers for the month of November were 22,130, down from 23,835 in October. As you are aware, DFR has a stated goal of 90% achievement for the metrics of EMS response within 9 minutes and Structure Fire Response within 5:20. The EMS metric remained below our targets at 85% but is an increase in performance from October. The Fire metric was up over 4% from October to 89%. These increases are attributed, in part, to improvements in response efficiency as a result of the ongoing Emergency Response Review Project as well as the Squad and Rescue Squad programs, which help mitigate gaps in emergency response coverage. We will continue to analyze the data and adjust resources and strategies as necessary to achieve our target goals.

We had 3 significant fires for the month of November, which was down from the 5 we had in October. As is normal for this time of year, our inspection activity decreased. Our rescue unit hours of utilization (UHU) numbers continue to decrease 34.8% overall, which is down 0.9% from the previous reporting period, continuing that positive trend.

We currently have 90 recruits in various stages of Training. All those recruits will be assigned to the field in the fall of next year.




# Defendant's Cumulative Response Rate Looking Back 23, 90 & 180 Days





SUBJECT Dallas Fire-Rescue's Fire Station Construction Projects Monthly Update

Please accept this memorandum as an update to the ongoing construction projects involving fire stations through a collaboration between Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR) and the Office of Bond and Construction Management (BCM), Office of Economic Development (ECO), and construction contractors:

- 1. Fire Station 41 (5920 Royal Ln) Construction is ongoing. The station remains on schedule to be open and operational in mid-January 2024. With completion of the permanent station imminent, DFR is no longer utilizing temporary Fire Station 41, which had been located at 5807 Royal Ln.
- 2. Fire Station 22 (12200 Coit Rd) Abatement of lead paint is complete. The station is expected to be open and operational this week.
- 3. Fire Station 56 (7040 Belt Line Rd) Kitchen remodel will be completed once delivery of cabinets and countertops is received. No ETA is currently available.
- 4. Fire Station 57 (10801 Audelia Rd) After the completion of the station's HVAC project, a leak in the roof was discovered. This has now been repaired, and installation of needed ceiling tiles will now be completed within the week.
- 5. Fire Station 27 (8401 Douglas Ave) recent flooding in the station has been rectified.
- 6. Fire Station 11 (3828 Cedar Springs Rd) evaluation is underway to determine scope of work for shower remodel and electrical panel replacement.

#### **SUBJECT Dallas Fire-Rescue Fleet Maintenance Update**

Dallas Fire-Rescue (DFR), to provide excellent service delivery to the residents of the City of Dallas, strives to maintain adequate resources to allow for efficient and effective emergency response. Please accept this memorandum as an update to the status of the DFR emergency fleet.

The status of emergency apparatus, as of December 4<sup>th</sup>, 2023, is as follows:

To address potential apparatus shortages and minimize negative effects on departmental operations, DFR has developed and deployed various strategies. The utilization of rental agreements has provided additional resources. The Squad Program places personnel assigned to heavy apparatus (engines and trucks) which are out of service for repairs on light weight vehicles with a modified response plan to mitigate gaps in emergency response coverage. The Rescue Squad program, similar in design to the Squad Program for heavy apparatus, has also been launched with success.

DFR's fleet maintenance program has evolved to include a more aggressive and comprehensive preventative maintenance plan for all apparatus, a stronger driver safety program, and the

deployment of three grant-funded blocker vehicles to increase safety on incidents occurring on major thoroughfares.

DFR also recently completed its first "combination remount" of an ambulance – which combines the chassis of one damaged ambulance with the module box of another. This process allows DFR the opportunity to realize one complete ambulance from two ambulances that would be otherwise be considered "total losses" from DFR's ambulance fleet. Moving forward, this technique will help address supply chain issues and return damaged equipment to productive service.

Optimally, DFR strives to maintain not only a full fleet of front-line apparatus, but also a minimum 15% reserve fleet for each unit type. Unfortunately, DFR's Fleet Maintenance Division has been severely challenged to meet this goal due to a myriad of obstacles including global supply chain issues for both repair parts and replacement units and motor vehicle collisions involving apparatus.

To address staffing concerns, DFR has strengthened its mechanic technician recruitment and retention through expanded recruitment sources and partnerships, improved salary scales, improved training, and a robust succession plan. Additionally, DFR has partnered with the Performance, Strategy, and Innovation Department to implement 5 key initiatives outlined from an extensive visioning exercise. The first initiative will focus on retention of mechanic technicians within the DFR Fleet Maintenance Shop.

DFR anticipates that through the above plans and programs, any negative operational effects from fleet shortages will be avoided. It is our expectation that the resulting improved operational, training, and staffing plans will aid in further protecting the status of our emergency fleet for years to come.

SUBJECT Dallas City Code Chapter 41A Amendment Briefing: Clarifying Requirements for Operators of Sexually Orientated Business

The purpose of this memorandum is to brief the members of the Public Safety Committee on the draft amendment to the Dallas City Code (DCC) Chapter 41A Section 41A-4.

#### **Background**

On January 26, 2022, the Dallas City Council passed Ordinance Number 32125, an ordinance amending Dallas City Code Chapter 41A, "Sexually Oriented Businesses." The ordinance provided that sexually oriented businesses could not operate between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. each day. Several sexually oriented business licensees have submitted applications to the Dallas Police Department for permits to operate a late-hours dance hall.

#### **DCC Amendment**

This code amendment provides regulatory clarity to licensees who obtain both a license to operate a sexually oriented business and a permit to operate a late-hours dance hall that whether they obtain a late hours permit or not, they must close between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.

Currently, Dallas City Code Section 41A-4(e) states that if a licensee has applied for, and received, both a sexually oriented business license and a dance hall license, the applicant must comply with the requirements of both Chapter 14, "Dance Halls," and Chapter 41A, "Sexually Oriented Businesses," of the Dallas City Code. The possession of a late-hours permit issued pursuant to Section 14-3.1 of the Dallas City Code does not exempt the licensee of a sexually oriented business license from the provisions of Section 41A-14.3(a) of the Dallas City Code.

Adding "[t]he possession of a late hours permit issued pursuant to Section 14-3.1 of the Dallas City Code does not exempt the person from the provisions of Section 41A-14.3(a) of this chapter[,]" to Section 41A-4, "License and Designated Operator Required," of Chapter 41A, "Sexually Oriented Businesses," will provide further clarification to operators of sexually oriented businesses seeking to obtain a late-hours dance hall permit.

An ordinance amending Chapter 41A, "Sexually Oriented Businesses," of the Dallas City Code by amending Section 41A-4; providing clarification that the possession of a late hours permit issued pursuant to Section 14-3.1 does not exempt a sexually oriented business from the hours of operation requirement in Section 41A-14.3; providing a penalty not to exceed \$4,000 and confinement in jail not to exceed one year; providing a saving clause; providing a severability clause; and providing an effective date.

#### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DALLAS:

SECTION 1. That Subsection (e) of Section 41A-4, "License and Designated Operator Required," of Chapter 41A, "Sexually Oriented Businesses," of the Dallas City Code is amended to read as follows:

- "(e) The fact that a person possesses a valid dance hall license does not exempt the person from the requirement of obtaining a sexually oriented business license. A person who operates a sexually oriented business and possesses a dance hall license shall comply with the requirements and provisions of this chapter as well as the requirements and provisions of Chapter 14 of this code when applicable. The possession of a late hours permit issued under Dallas City Code Section 14-3.1 does not exempt the person from the provisions of Section 41A-14.3(a) of this chapter."
- SECTION 2. That a person violating a provision of this ordinance, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$4,000 and confinement in jail not to exceed one year.
- SECTION 3. That Chapter 41A of the Dallas City Code shall remain in full force and effect, save and except as amended by this ordinance.

SECTION 4. That any act done or right vested or accrued, or any proceeding, suit, or prosecution had or commenced in any action before the amendment or repeal of any ordinance, or part thereof, shall not be affected or impaired by amendment or repeal of any ordinance, or part thereof, and shall be treated as still remaining in full force and effect for all intents and purposes as if the amended or repealed ordinance, or part thereof, had remained in force.

SECTION 5. That the terms and provisions of this ordinance are severable and are governed by Section 1-4 of Chapter 1 of the Dallas City Code, as amended.

SECTION 6. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and publication in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Dallas, and it is accordingly so ordained.

#### **SUBJECT Dallas Police Expediting Unauthorized Use of Motor Vehicle Reports**

On July 3, 2023, the Dallas Police Department (DPD) began requiring specific nonemergency incidents to be reported through the Dallas Online Reporting System or by reporting the incident over the phone. This requirement aimed to improve the efficiency of operations and to increase patrol officer availability for high-priority calls.

As part of DPD's continued efforts to improve response times and report stolen vehicles more efficiently to the National Crime Information Center (NCIC), on December 18, 2023, DPD will begin a trial period of taking Unauthorized Use of Motor Vehicle (UUMV) reports through recorded call conferencing. During the trial period, DPD will utilize limited-duty police officers to complete the reports. In addition, the trial period will allow DPD to test call conferencing technology to find the best user-friendly option for our citizens.

Over the last three (3) years, DPD has responded to an average of 18,500 UUMV calls for service. Thus far in 2023, these low-priority calls have had an average response time of over twelve and a half (12.5) hours. In addition, patrol officers have averaged 1.8 hours to complete each call for service. This initiative is forecasted to increase patrol officer availability by up to 33,300 hours annually.

This grant award is from U.S. Department of Treasury pass-through the Office of Governor - Criminal Justice Division to the City of Dallas. The Dallas Police Department's Victim Services Program, formally established in April 1996, provides victims of violent crimes with crisis intervention, information regarding the criminal justice process, information and referral services specifically for victims or family survivors, and court accompaniment requested by the victim. Services are provided through telephone contact, office visits, and/or home visits. The Police Department's goal is to lessen the trauma experienced by people who are victimized by violent crimes.

#### BACKGROUND

Providing first responders with equipment and tools that mitigate the dangers and hazards associated with protecting the public from harm is critical.

Ballistic-resistant body armor enhances the survivability of officers subjected to hostile fire from various forms of ballistic rounds. Ballistic-resistant body armor consists of rifle plates in conjunction with a concealable vest. The National Institute of Justice (NIJ) has developed a series of nationally accepted ratings for body armor worn by law enforcement officers. These ratings define the level of ballistic performance.

To meet this safety need, ballistic-resistant body armor has become a standard issuance item to each officer in the Dallas Police Department. Ballistic-resistant body armor is sized and tailored to fit each officer and intended for daily wear while on duty. This body armor offers level III protection rated by NIJ.

In response to the safety needs for officers across the State of Texas, the Office of the Governor developed a grant solicitation for rifle-resistant body armor for award to law enforcement agencies. The City of Dallas applied and was awarded \$961,684.50. The submitted grant application requested funding to purchase 656 rifle resistant body armor sets. All concealable vests and rifle plates can be purchased through the Dallas Police Department's existing master agreement that was awarded in September 2020.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The overall goal of this project is to test approximately 175 cases worth of backlogged untested sexual assault kits. The Dallas Police Department will measure success using a database to capture the number of kits tested and the outcome of the testing. The outcomes include developing suspect Deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA) profiles to be entered into Combined DNA Index System, which can then identify an unknown assailant, or which can be linked forensically to other offenses. This information provides a new lead that the detective did not have before the kit was tested.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Increases in internet-based crimes against children continue to be a serious concern across the nation and within the city of Dallas. These offenses pertain to children ranging in age from newborn to 17 years old who are victims of internet and/or technology facilitated crimes. The State of Texas Internet Crimes Against Children grant allows the City to supplement current efforts by funding staff to investigate and research these crimes. The grant funded positions are part of a larger team working together to solve and eliminate internet crimes and trafficking against children.

The 2023-24 State of Texas Internet Crimes Against Children Grant will provide \$303,159.40 to enhance the response of the Dallas Crimes Against Children Task Force in the area of prevention, investigation, and prosecution of computer-facilitated systems and other technology. Staff are responsible for the investigation of cybertips originating at National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, cell phone forensics, computer and electronic device preview and evidence analysis, suspect and witness interviews, surveillance operations, arrests, and other critical tasks. In FY 2023, staff assigned to this grant were able to investigate over 24,921 cybertips, conduct 196 forensic exams, and made approximately 18 felony arrests for charges related to the sexual exploitation of children.

#### BACKGROUND

This action does not encumber funds; the purpose of a price agreement is to establish firm pricing for services, for a specific term, which are ordered on an as needed basis according to annual budgetary appropriations. The estimated amount is intended as guidance rather than a cap on spending under the agreement, so that the need combined with the amount budgeted will determine the amount spent under this agreement.

Beginning in January 2000, the City of Dallas has annually entered into an interlocal agreement with Dallas County for forensic laboratory services through Southwestern Institute of Forensic Sciences at Dallas, also known as SWIFS.

SWIFS' services include analysis of drug evidence, Deoxyribonucleic Acid (DNA) analysis and comparison, microscopic (trace) evidence analysis, and identification of fire accelerants. These services are vital to the successful investigation and prosecution of crime.

The proposed Interlocal Agreement will provide services from October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2026. The \$4,100,000.00 estimated annual cost is shared between Dallas Police Department \$4,090,000.00 and with the Fire Department \$10,000.00.
