Rules of Courtesy

City Council meetings bring together citizens of many varied interests and ideas. To insure fairness and orderly meetings, the Council has adopted rules of courtesy which apply to all members of the Council, administrative staff, news media, citizens and visitors. These procedures provide:

- That no one shall delay or interrupt the proceedings, or refuse to obey the orders of the presiding officer.
- All persons should refrain from private conversation, eating, drinking and smoking while in the Council Chamber.
- Posters or placards must remain outside the Council Chamber.
- No cellular phones or audible beepers allowed in Council Chamber while City Council is in session.

"Citizens and other visitors attending City Council meetings shall observe the same rules of propriety, decorum and good conduct applicable to members of the City Council. Any person making personal, impertinent, profane or slanderous remarks or who becomes boisterous while addressing the City Council or while attending the City Council meeting shall be removed from the room if the sergeant-at-arms is so directed by the presiding officer, and the person shall be barred from further audience before the City Council during that session of the City Council. If the presiding officer fails to act, any member of the City Council may move to require enforcement of the rules, and the affirmative vote of a majority of the City Council shall require the presiding officer to act." Section 3.3(c) of the City Council Rules of Procedure.

Handgun Prohibition Notice for Meetings of Governmental Entities

"Pursuant to Section 46.03, Penal Code (places weapons prohibited), a person may not carry a firearm or other weapon into any open meeting on this property."

6. discussing or deliberating commercial or financial information that the city has received from a business prospect that the city seeks to have locate, stay or expand in or near the city and with which the city is conducting economic development negotiations; or deliberating the offer of a financial or other incentive to a business prospect. [Tex Govt. Code § 551.087]
7. deliberating security assessments or deployments relating to information resources technology, network security information, or the deployment or specific occasions for implementations of security personnel, critical infrastructure, or security devices. [Tex Govt. Code § 551.089]
8. deliberating cybersecurity measures, policies, or contracts solely intended to protect a critical infrastructure facility. [Tex. Gov't Code § 551.0761]

Background

- **Greenhouse gas inventories take 18-24 months to complete**
 - Current inventory looking at year 2023 data initiated October 2024
 - Aided by Gresham Smith (consultant) & ICF (sub-consultant)
 - Environmental Management System objective & target for OEQS
- **Collect data from multiple sources**
 - City departments, utilities, NCTCOG, state & federal databases
 - All data needed may not be available; best practices are used to aid in calculating emissions
- **Calculations and QA/QC**
 - International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives (ICLEI)
ClearPath tool used for emissions calculations and reporting.

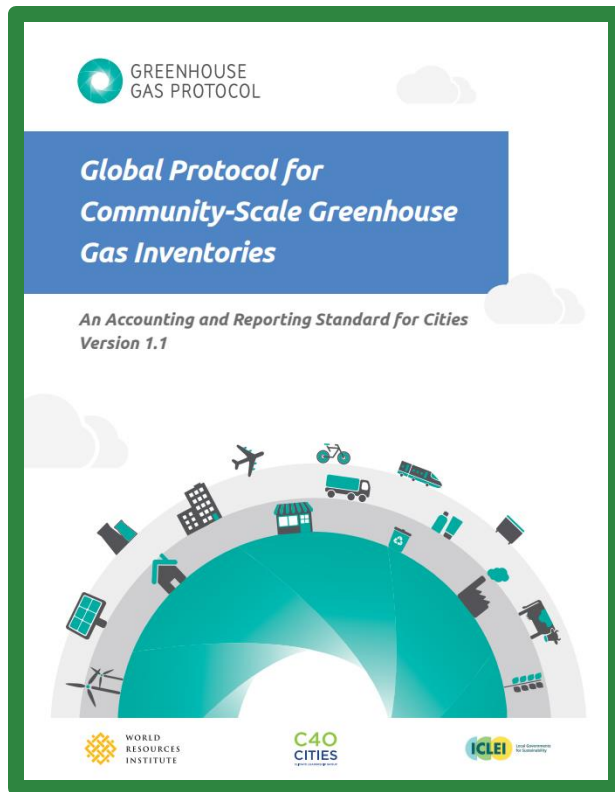

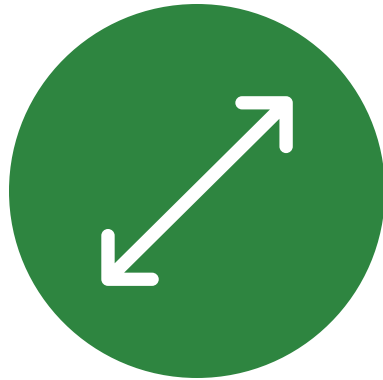
Greenhouse Gases 101

- CO₂ is the most abundant GHG on the planet.
- A Global Warming Potential (GWP) value has been developed for each greenhouse gas.
- The value accounts for the difference in climate impact for each GHG by comparing it to one molecule of CO₂ whose GWP value is one.
- MT CO₂e=Metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent

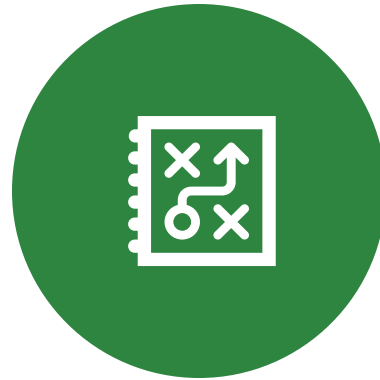

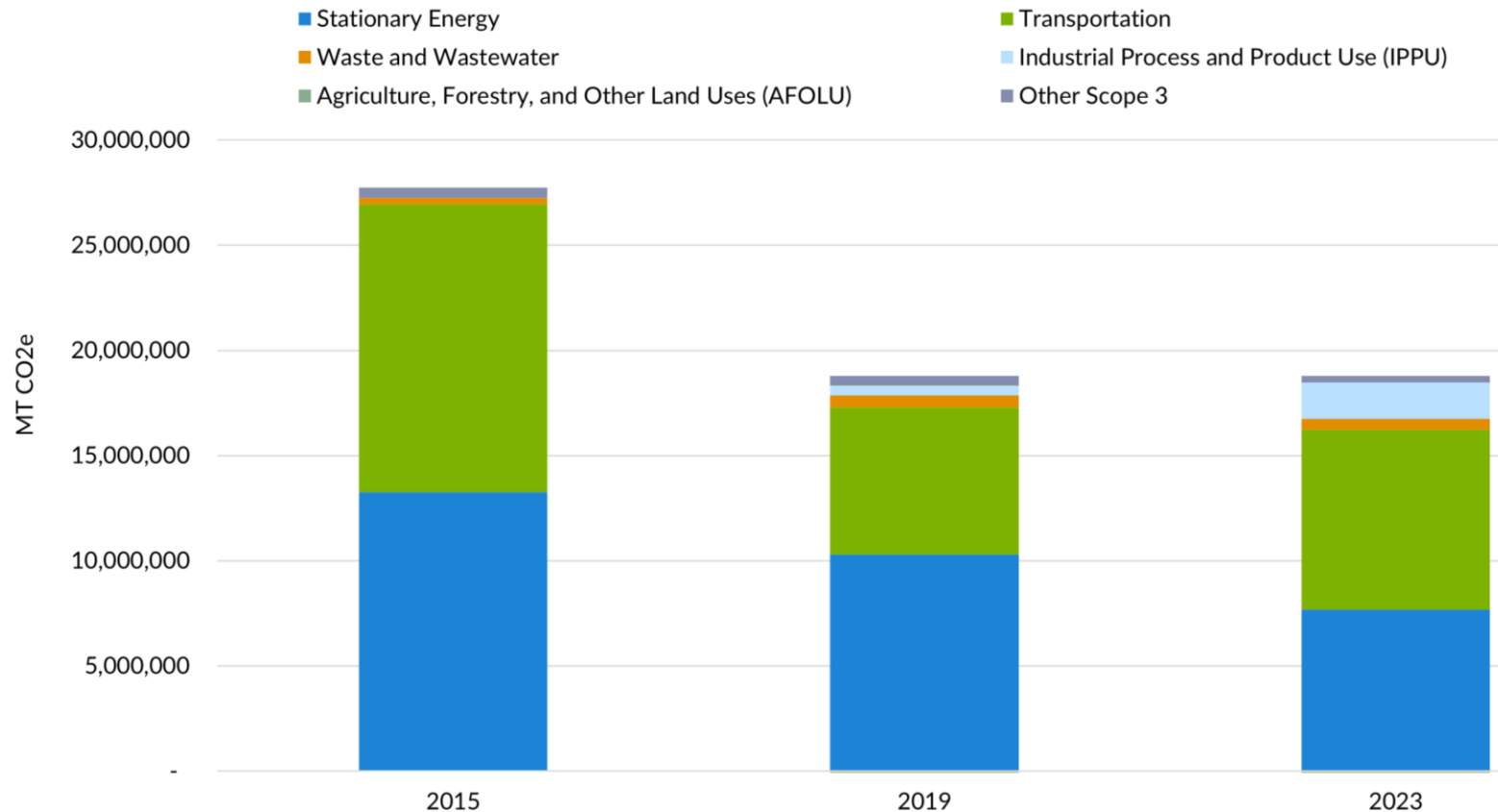

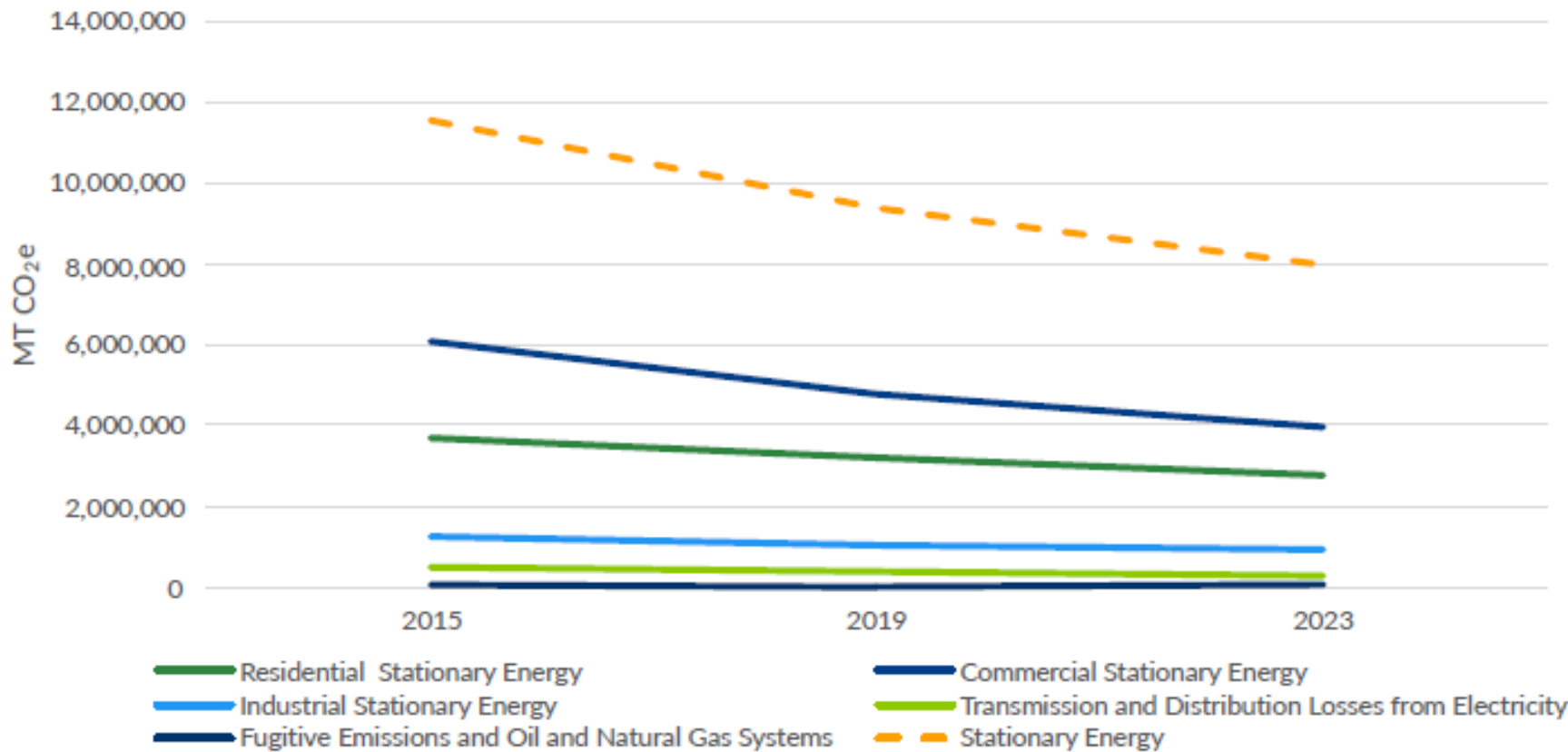

Figure 3-3. Stationary Energy Emissions by Category



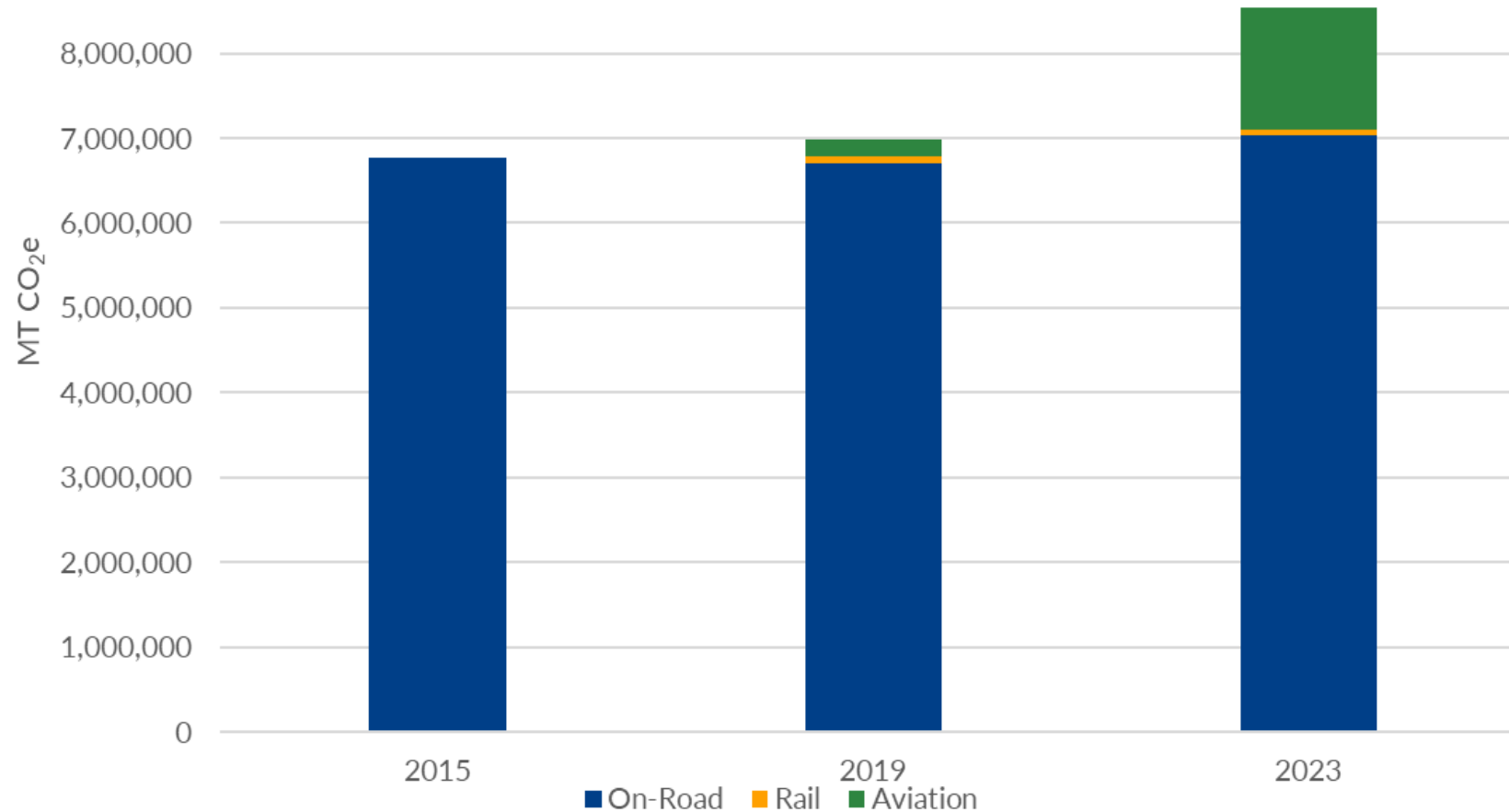

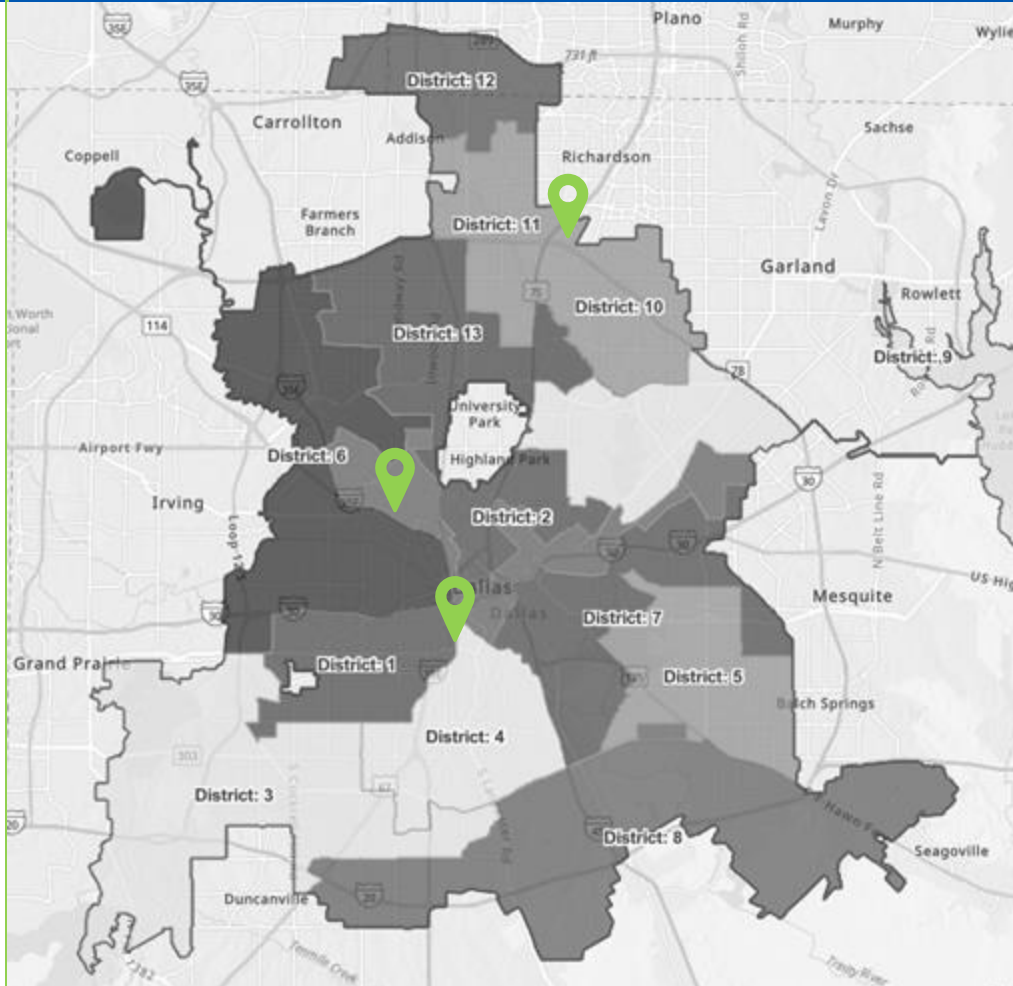

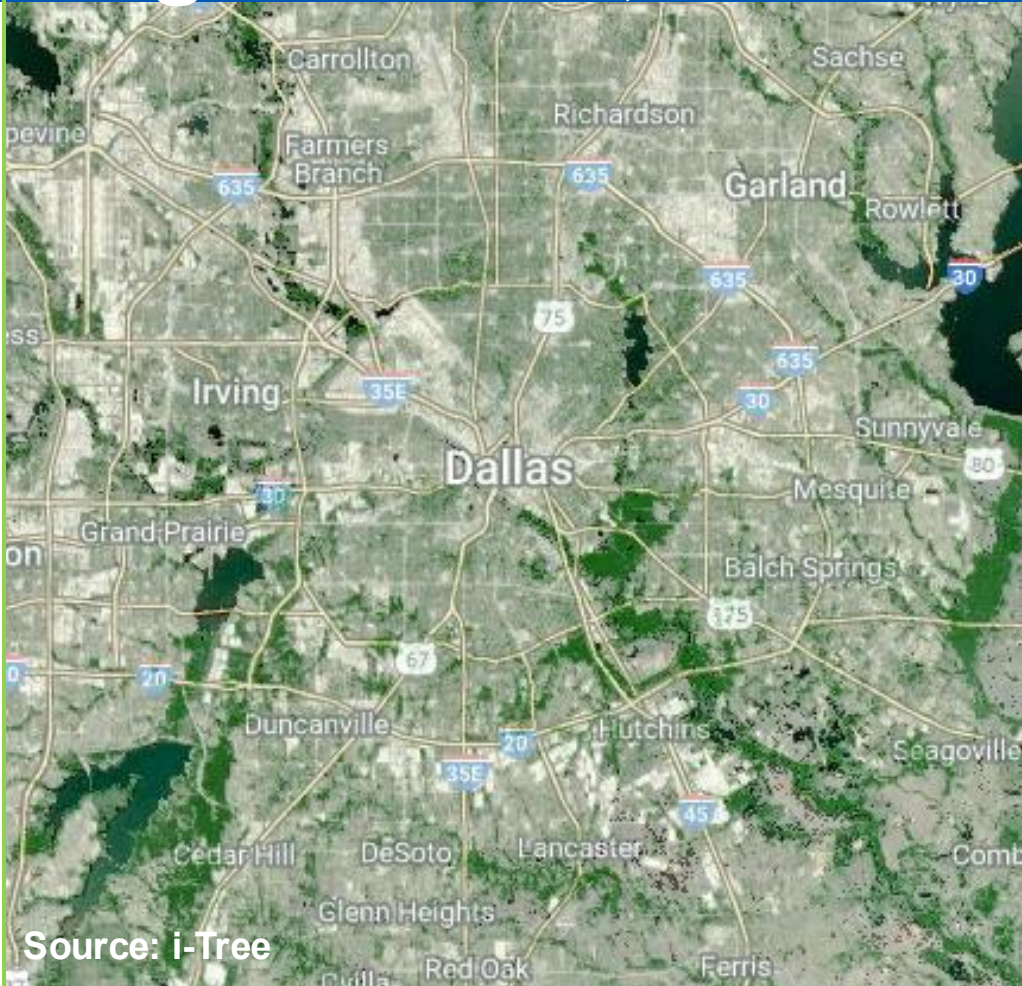

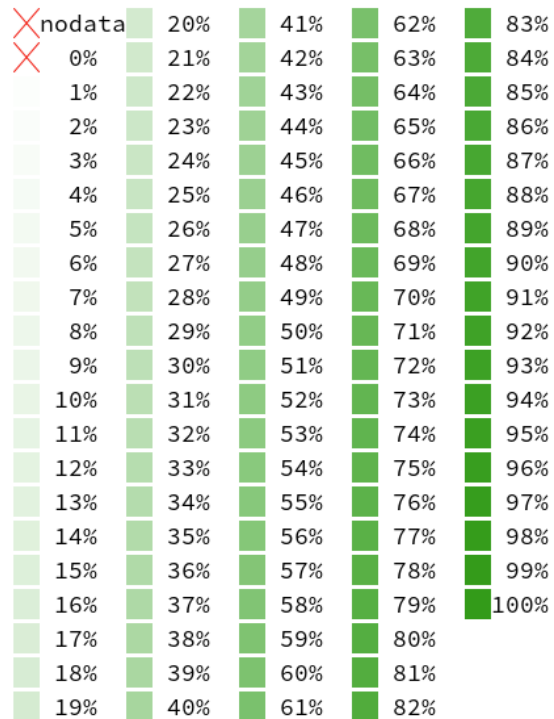

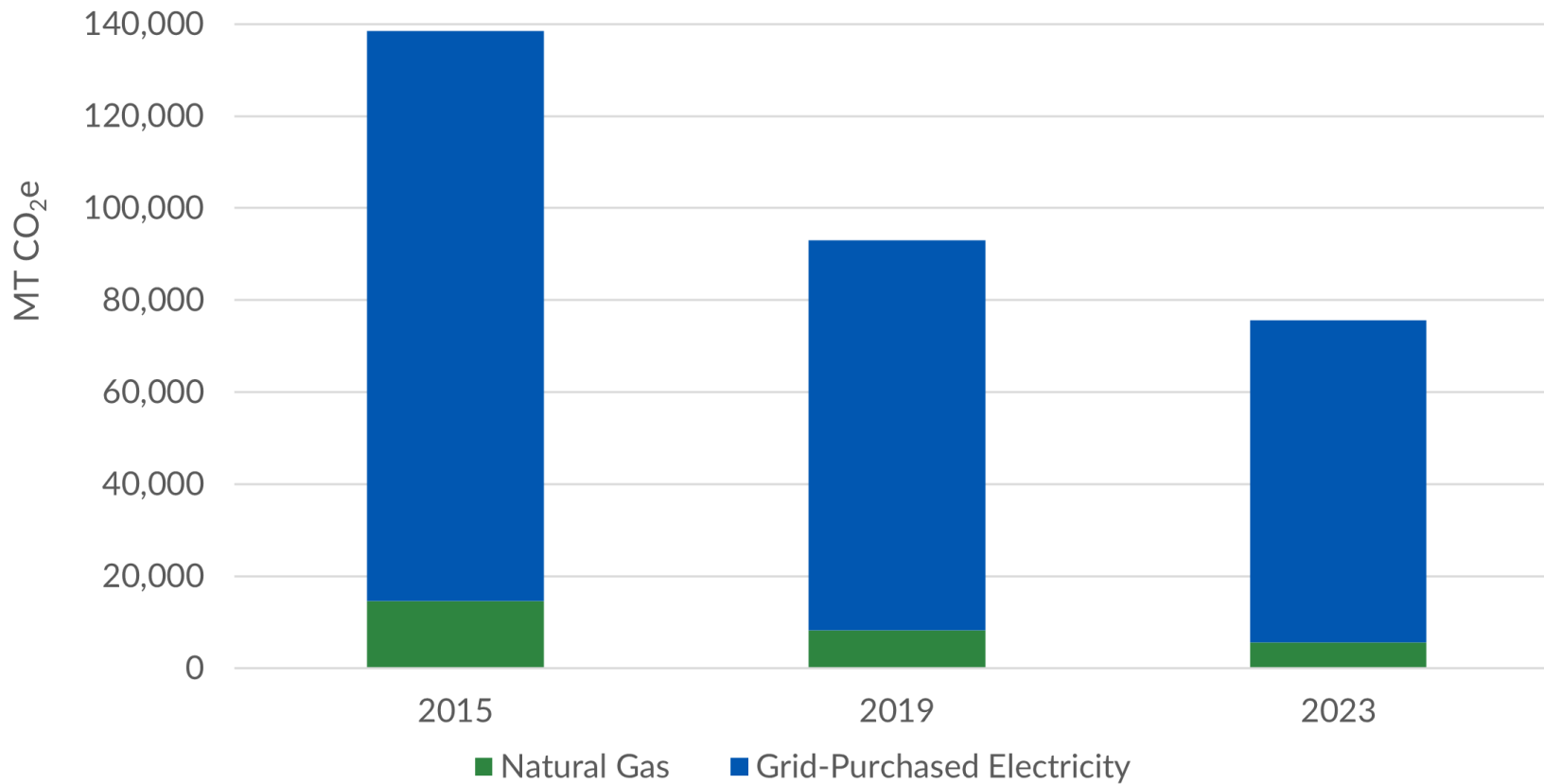

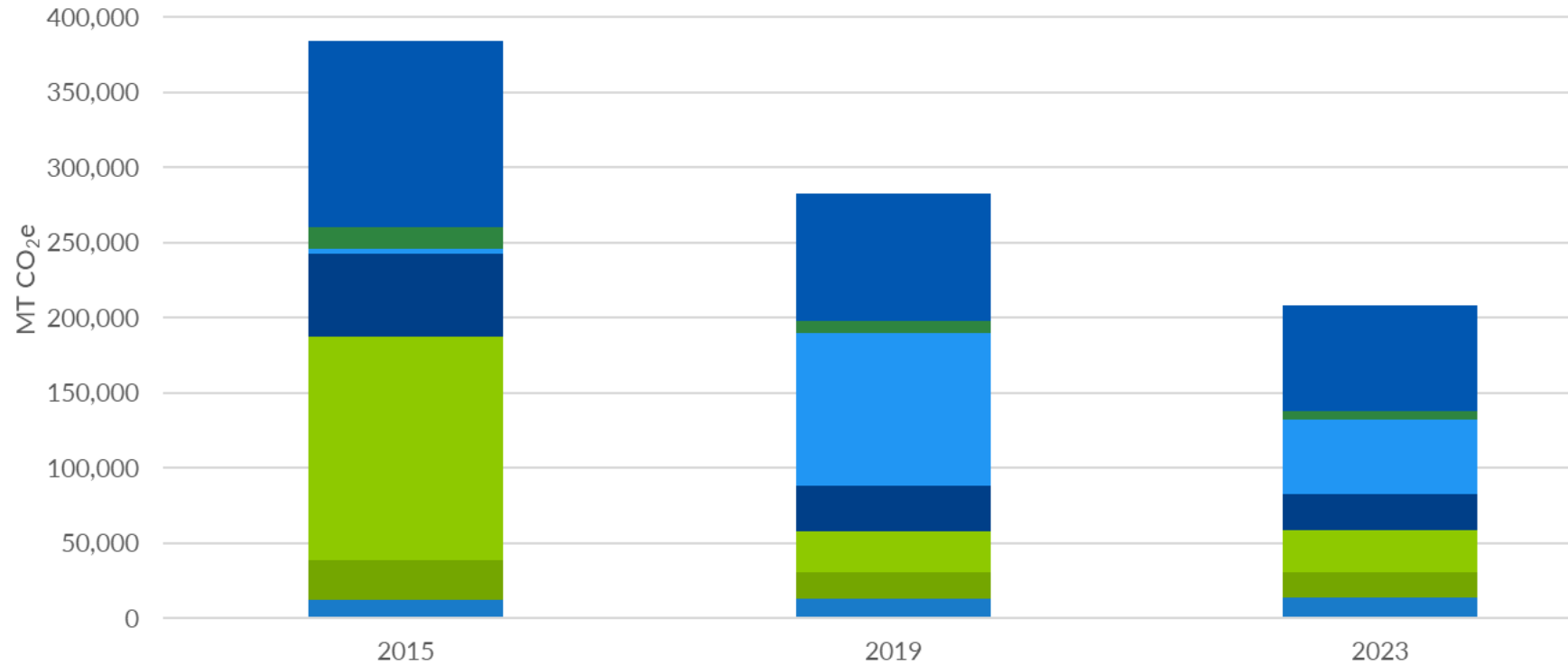

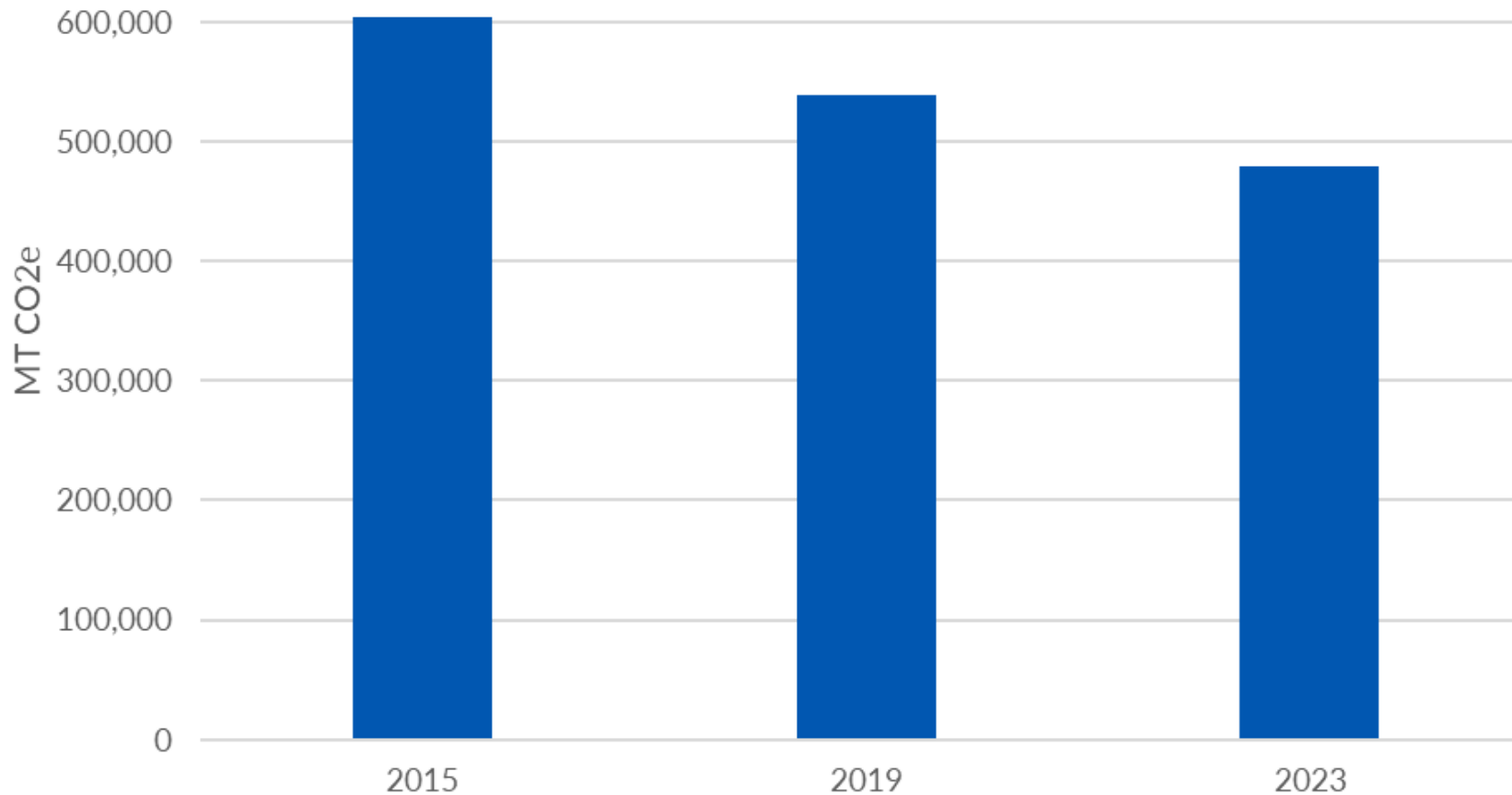

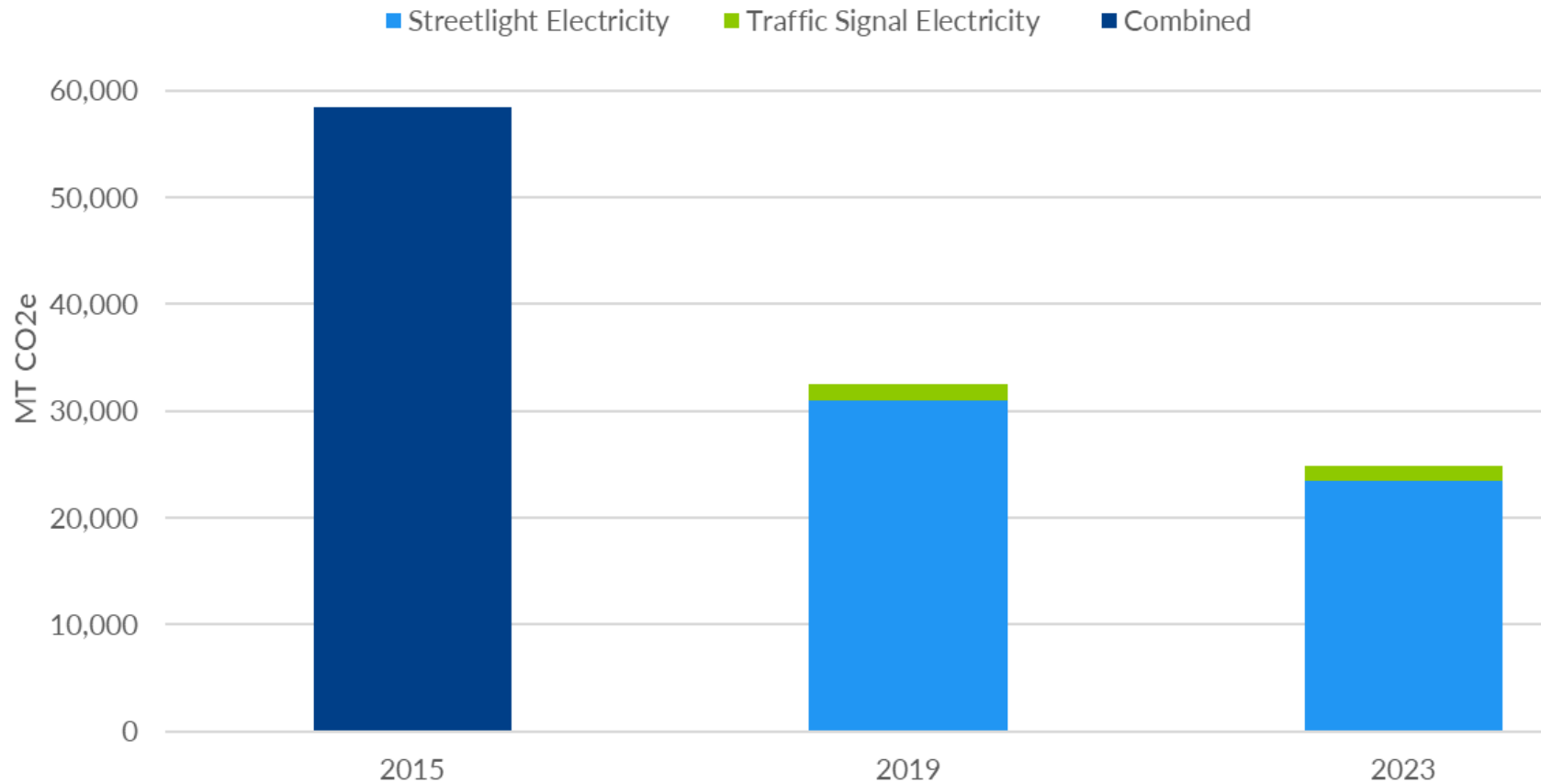

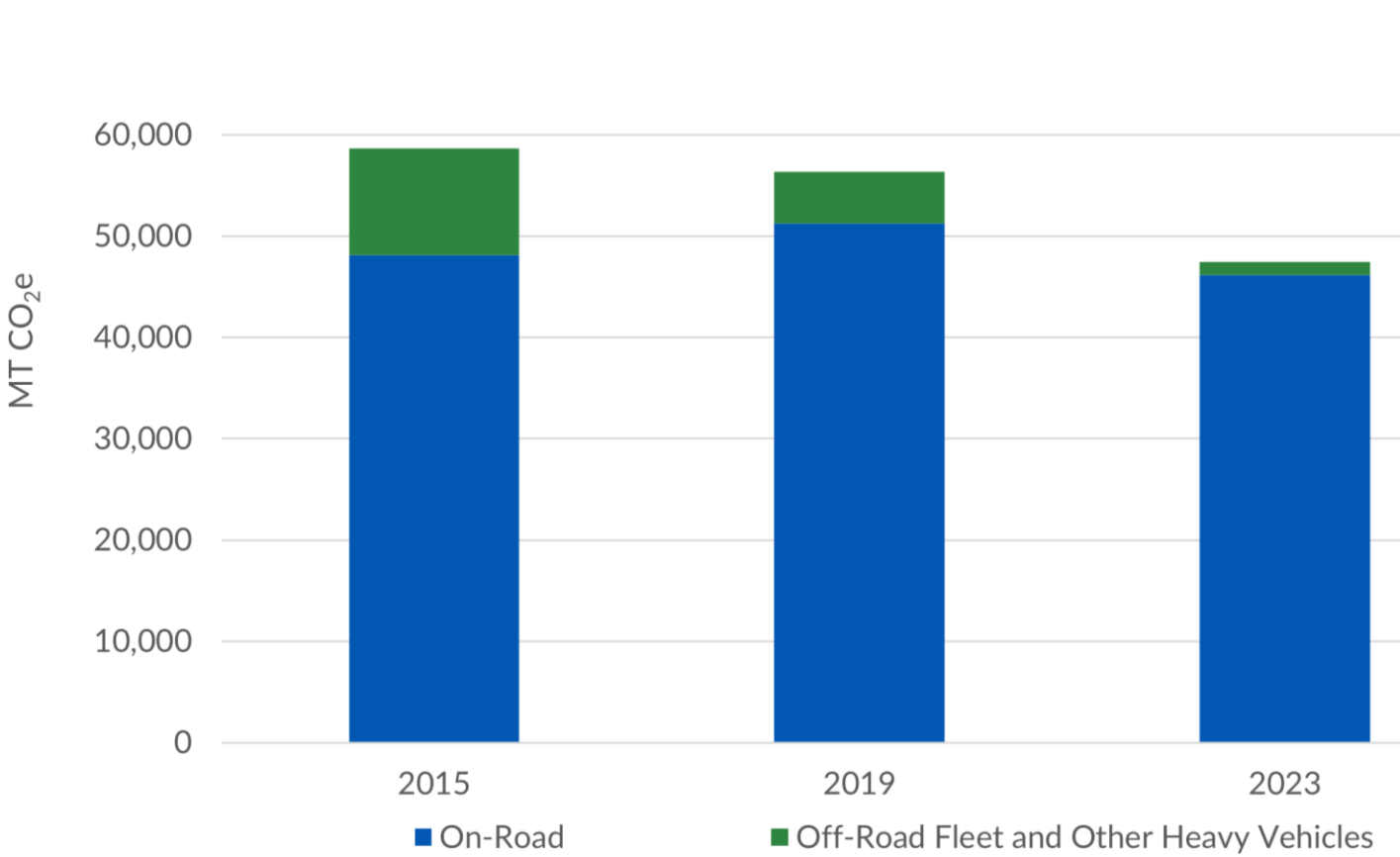

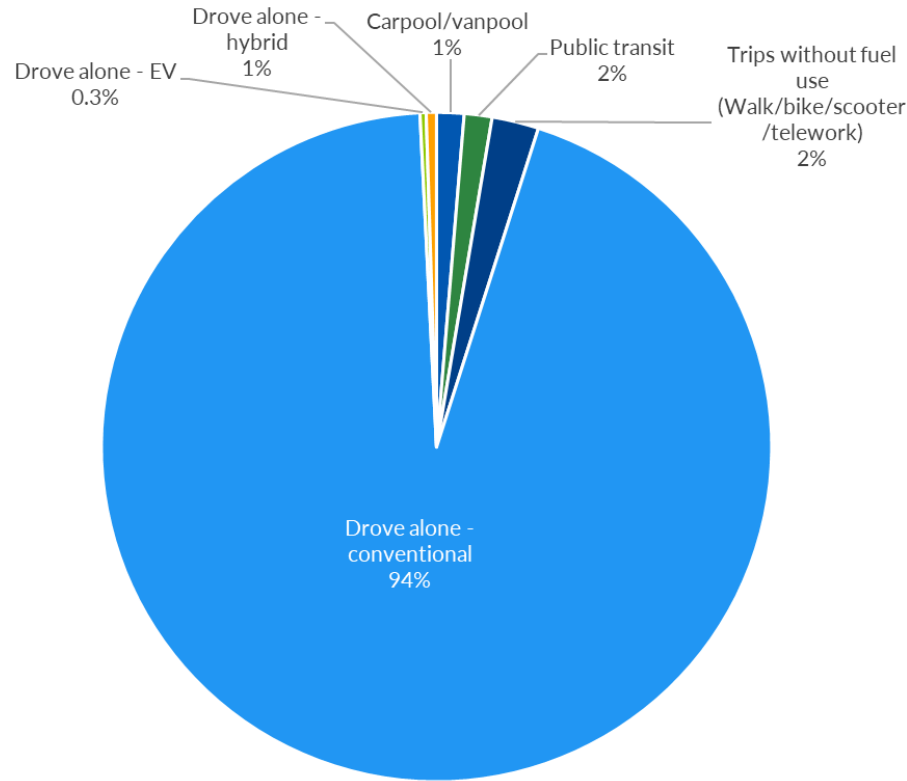

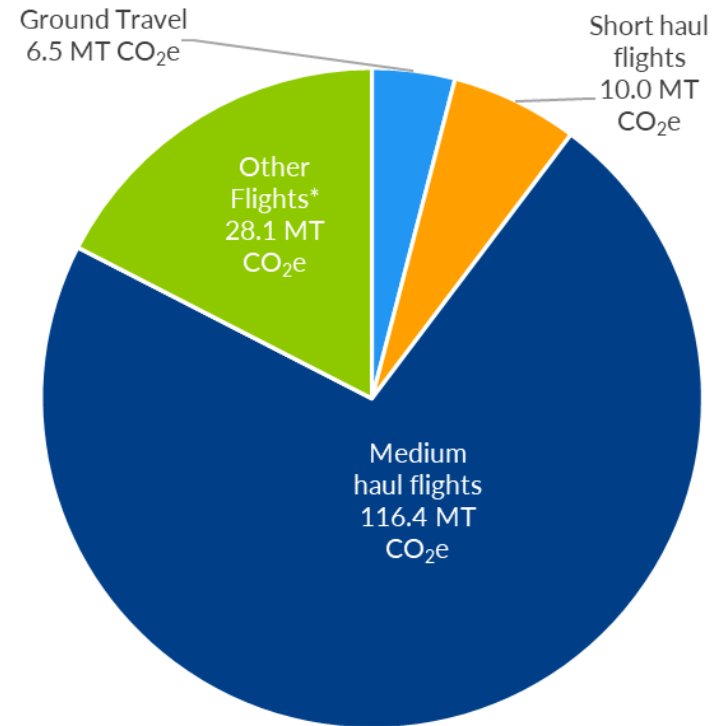

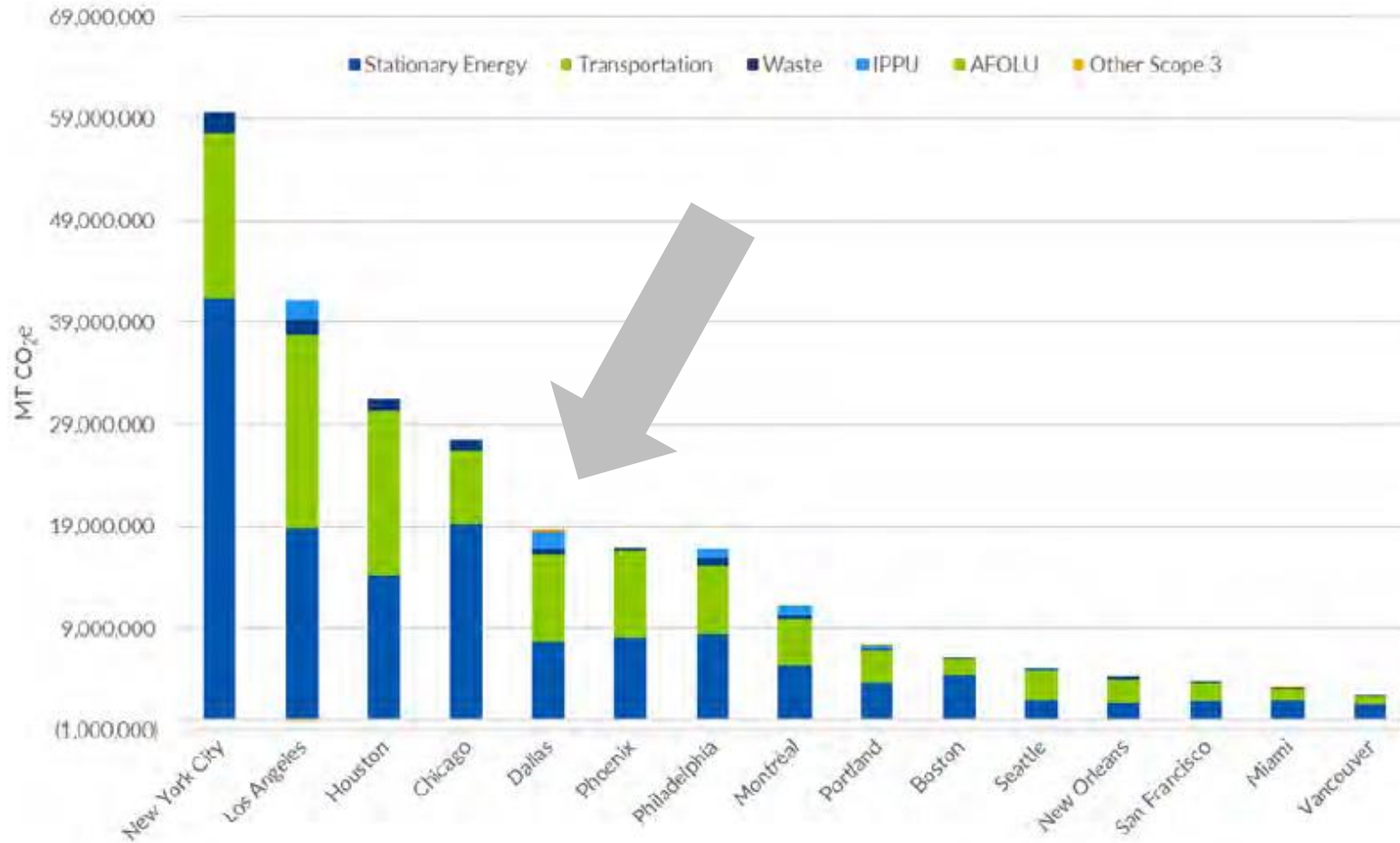

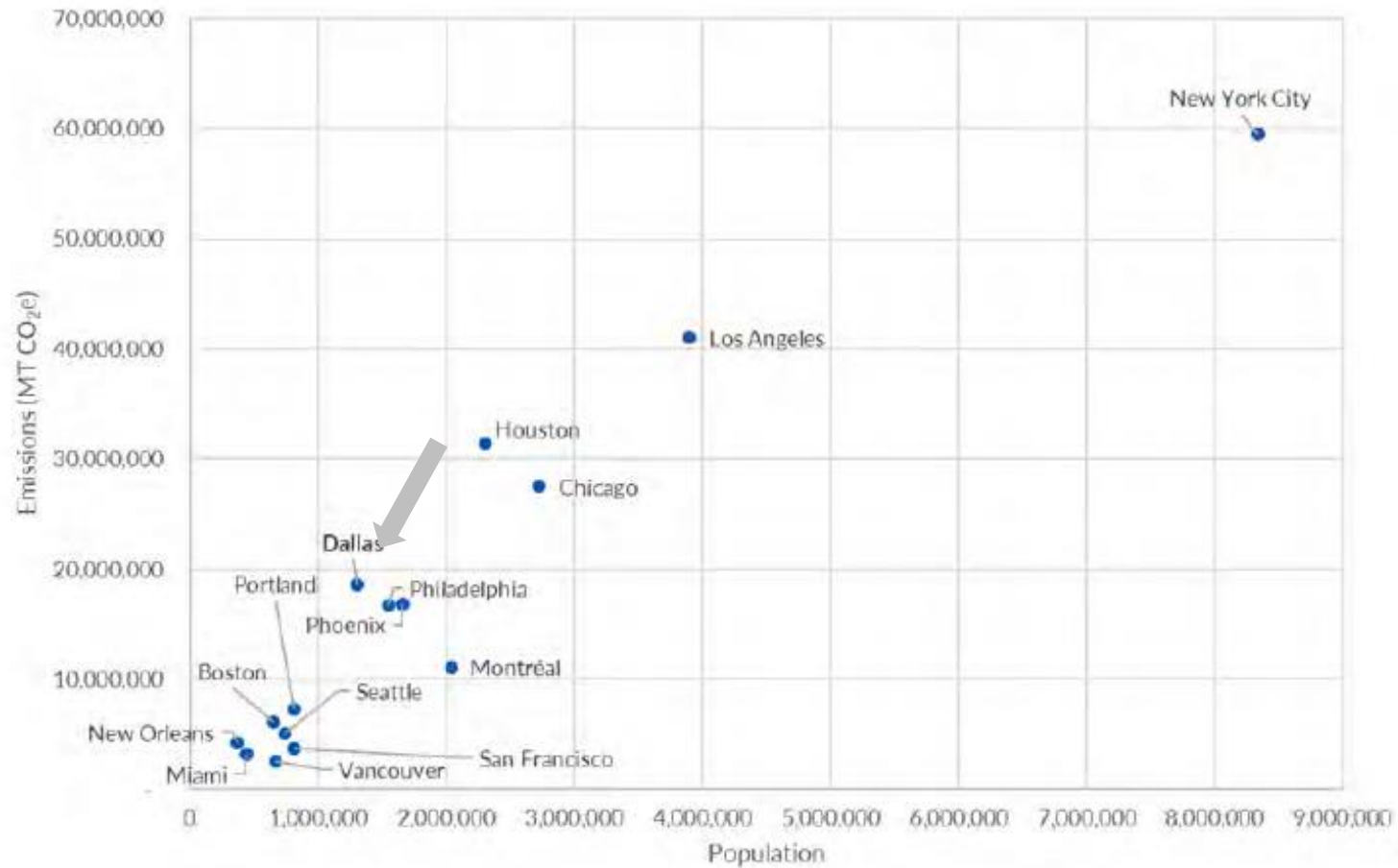

The C40 is a network of 94 city mayors across the globe that are taking climate action that aligns with science-backed targets.

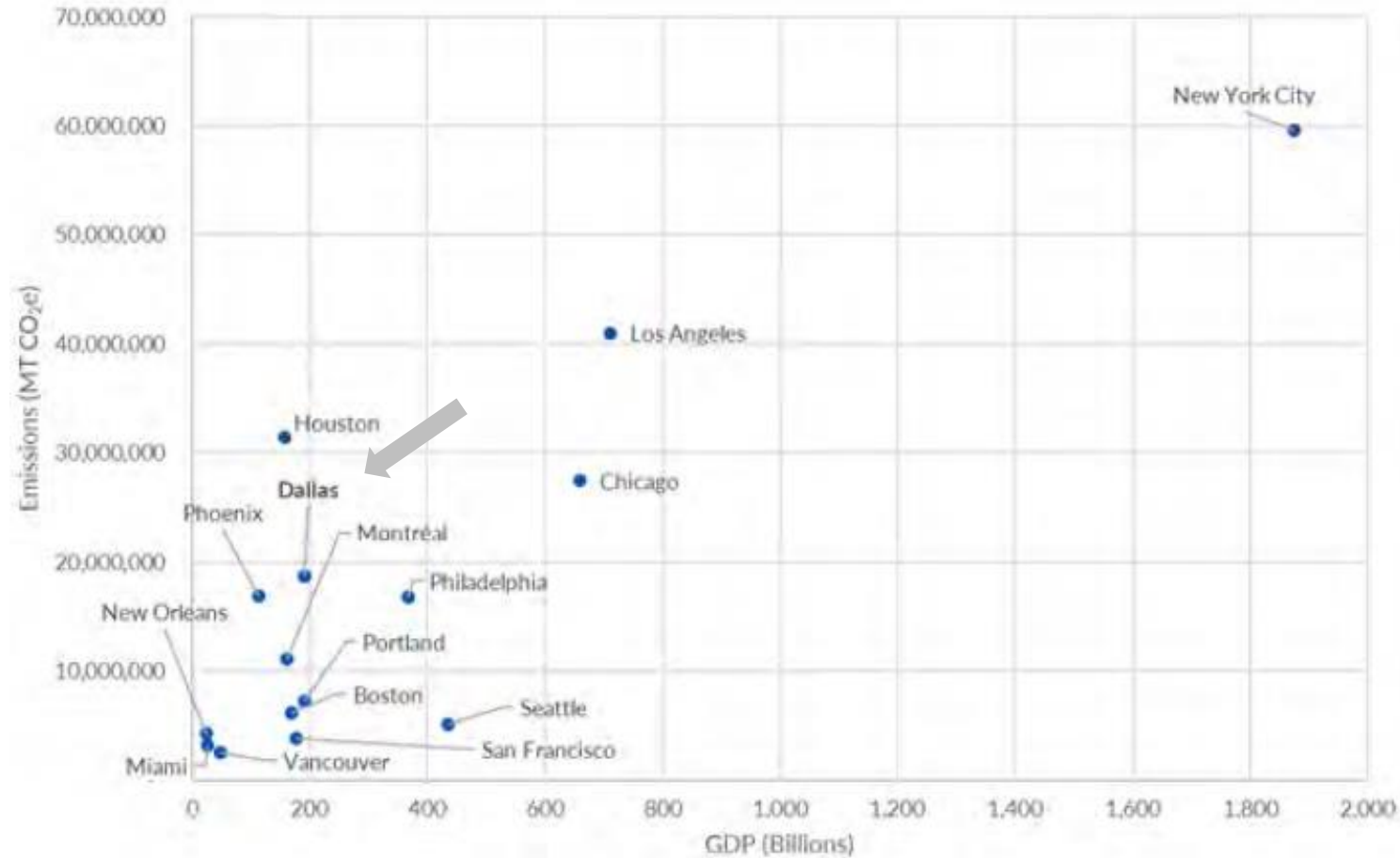
Dallas vs Cities of similar population

SUBJECT **North Texas Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Call for Projects Update**

This memorandum provides an update on the City of Dallas' submission to the North Central Texas Council of Governments' (NCTCOG) North Texas Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Call for Projects (CFP).

BACKGROUND

In August 2025, the NCTCOG opened the North Texas EV Infrastructure CFP to select public-sector properties for installation of Level 2 or Direct Current Fast Charge (DCFC) stations. Level 2 stations are common in commercial and public settings and can charge an electric vehicle battery to 80% in approximately 4 to 10 hours. This funding opportunity is available exclusively for projects on land owned by public entities, including local governments, transit agencies, school districts, and universities, with an emphasis on filling gaps in the existing charging infrastructure network. The program is supported by a \$15 million award from the Federal Highway Administration's Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Community Program.

Eligible costs include:

- Charging and electrical equipment
- Construction and site improvements
- Operations and maintenance

Grant funding will cover up to 80% of initial deployment capital costs and up to 20% of operations and maintenance costs for Level 2 charging stations. Funding is provided on a reimbursement basis, with selected public agencies responsible for covering initial installation costs. Agencies are required to advance payment to the chosen vendor and will be reimbursed for eligible project costs.

NCTCOG's project eligibility framework uses a points-based scoring system to prioritize EV charging sites:

- **Access Gaps (up to 60 points):** Areas with insufficient existing charging infrastructure based on charger-to-vehicle ratios and community/economic development needs.
- **Potential Demand (up to 20 points):** Locations that support multimodal hubs, first- and last-mile connections, rideshare activity, or municipal/community fleets.
- **Public Engagement (up to 10 points):** Incorporates locations recommended by the public, such as parks, recreation centers, and schools.
- **Feasibility and Risk (up to 10 points):** Assesses project readiness and mitigation strategies.

- **Fatal Flaws (0 points):** Sites with significant issues, such as inadequate electrical capacity or flood risk, are eliminated from consideration.

Dallas' site selection approach followed a coordinated, step-by-step process that combined departmental input, data-driven analysis, and on-the-ground feasibility reviews. This process supported the City's Comprehensive Environmental and Climate Action Plan (CECAP) Goal 3, advancing access to sustainable, affordable transportation and the target of installing 1,500 EV charging outlets by 2030. OEQS began by convening with City departments to introduce the funding opportunity and gather preliminary feedback on priority sites. OEQS then screened candidate locations using findings from the 2024 EV Charging Infrastructure Siting Study. Site visits were conducted with NCTCOG's Kimley-Horn consultant team to assess technical and operational feasibility, and the list of sites was refined based on the feedback collected. Finally, draft applications were shared with departments to validate site details prior to submission, ensuring that selected locations were feasible, coordinated, and aligned with Citywide goals.

NEXT STEPS

NCTCOG released award recommendations for the North Texas EV Infrastructure CFP on December 8, 2025. The City of Dallas submitted an application with 16 City locations including recreation centers, libraries, and Dallas Love Field Airport. Of these, 10 sites have been recommended for funding, and four sites have been placed on a waitlist for potential future funding that the NCTCOG may receive.

The 10 selected sites have a total estimated project cost of \$645,600.

On January 8, 2026, the Regional Transportation Council reviewed and approved the award recommendations. The NCTCOG Executive Board is expected to approve the final sites in late January 2026. After approval, NCTCOG will begin executing interlocal agreements with awarded public agencies. Once the City of Dallas receives official notice of selected sites, the departments that own and operate these locations will determine the project's cost structure and feasibility before presenting the grant to City Council for official acceptance and approval. NCTCOG will also oversee the procurement of EV charging station vendors on behalf of participating entities.
